## St. George's Church, Stockport

ST. GEORGES CHURCH, STOCKPORT, was the gift of a parishioner, Major G Fearn. As well as bearing the cost of the church, he also provided a vicarage and two schools, the total gift amounting to $£ 140,000$. In his will he also set up a Trust to maintain the fabric of the church, the bells and the schools.
The church was consecrated by the Lord Bishop of Chester on February 25, 1897, excavations for the building having been started in 1892. There have been three vicars. The first, appointed in 1895, was the Rev. J. H. Thorpe, who remained vicar until his death in January. 1932. He was succeeded by the Rev. A. Pownall, who left in 1948 to take up the living of St. Alban's, Tattenhall; and the present vicar, Canon Garlick, was inducted on June 26, 1948.
The church stands in a commanding position between two main thoroughfares. It is built throughout of flecked Runcorn sandstone. and the architect was Mr. Hubert James Austin. It is designed in Transition Decorated and Perpendicular style of architecture, with central tower and spire. The tower height is 112 feet to the parapet, whilst the spire reaches to a height of 235 feet. It is built on a concrete raft $37 \times 34$ feet square and eight feet thick.

In the tower is hung a ring of ten bells. These were cast and hung by Mears and Stainbank in 1896 and are on plain bearings in a wooden frame. The weight of the tenor is 29 cwt .3 qr .12 lb. , the total weight of the bells being 127 cwt . 3 qr .14 lb .
The bells were first rung by a band consisting mainly of ringers from St. Mary's, Stocknort, on August 1, 1896, to a touch of Grandsire Triples. The first peal was rung three months later, 5040 Grandsire Triples on November 7, in 3 hours 12 minutes, conducted by T. Marshall, and to date 44 peals have been rung. The peals are made un of : 5 Plain Bob (1 Major, 4 Royal), 8 Grandsire ( 2 Triples, 6 Caters), 10 Stedman ( 3 Triples, 7 Caters), 9 Treble Bob Royal and 20 Surprise Royal.
The band formed to ring the bells had their first official meeting on September 28, 1896, when the St. George's Society of Ringers was formed. Originally it numhered five, but by the beginning of November a further eight recruits were gained. On April 4, 1897, the local ringers rang their first touch, Grandsire Triples. the band consisting of four of the original five plus four recruits, who at the time of joining had no knowledge of ringing.

## THREE STEEPLEKEEPERS

From the minutes of their meetings it would appear that the society was run on democratic lines. The chairman, treasurer and secretary were elected annually, but the conductor quarterly. This latter practice was discontinued in 1935, since when the conductor has been elected annually. Al. though the steeplekeeper was elected annually, from 1896 to 1968 only three people held the office. They were J. W. Raylev (1896-1918), T. Jackson (1918-1932) and Peter Laflin (1932-1968), and during this period the bells have been rung regularly, ex-
cept during the second world war. From time to time they have been overhauled, the first in December, 1914, when the tenor was rehung on a cast iron headstock, and the second on a new wooden one. In 1948 the ninth was hung on ball bearings and general repairs made. At the present time the seventh is being fitted with a metal headstock and put on ball bearings
In the tower is housed the "Beeston Library," the library of the Chester Diocesan Guild of Church Bellringers. This is the collection of books and manuscripts belonging to the late Rev. A. T. Beeston and presented by him to the guild.

## FOULED BY CLOCK HAMMER

The newly-formed University of Bradford Guild had rather a disastrous inception when it held its first practice on January 17 at Queensbury. After some tied practice for newcomers to the art the bells were raised and proceedings continued with rounds for other leamers.
It was soon apparent that the ringers of the fifth and sixth were having difficulties. The sixth finally came to rest with the rope at a higher than normal position and investigation aloft revealed that the bell was jammed on one side by a clock hammer and against a metal frame. All efforts to free it proved fruitless. The wire holding the hammer clear of the bell had broken and the other end of the rod to which the hammer was attached was fouling the fifth.
The vicar was present during the ringing and it is hoped that things will soon be corrected and the guild's activities can continue.

## Society of Royal Cumberland Youths

## STANDARDS TOO HIGH FOR ENJOYMENT?

more meetings needed in the provinces, slggests mr. G. w. pipe


#### Abstract

"That your society may be in danger of setting too high a standard of strikingin certain circumstances . . . and that a standard in ringing must, to some degree, be tailored to the people with whom you are ringing and the area in which you are ringing. If this is not done, there is a danger of losing that very real and proper element in ringing, which is enjoyment. "In addition, for the overall welfare of the society you may have to deploy a little more strength, effort, travelling and arranging in the provinces . . . . It is very easy to lose sight of members in country towns and villages."


These two observations were made by Mr. George W. Pipe (Ipswich) in proposing the toast of "The Society" when the 225th anniversary year dinner was held at Carisbrooke Hall (Victory Ex-Services Club), London, on February 5. There was a very large and representative attendance and a happy, lighthearted spirit prevailed throughout the whole evening. The chairman, by invitation, was the immediate past master of the society, Mr. Edwin A. Barnett, who was accompanied by Mrs. Olive Barnett. Others at the principal table were the master (Mr. Dennis Beresford) and Mrs. Beresford, Rev. Austen Williams (St. Martin-in-the-Fields), Archdeacon Timms, Sir Trenchard Cox, Rev. R. Thompson and Mrs. Thompson, Mr. George W. Pipe and Mrs. Pipe, Mr. M. P. Deveraux, Mr. A. R. Patterson (master, College Youths) and Mrs. Patterson, Mr. Derek E. Sibson (hon. secretary, Cumberlands) and Mrs. Sibson, Mr. J. S. Barnes (senior steward) and Mrs. Barnes, Mr. C. P. Starbuck (juhior steward) and Mrs. Starbuck.

Following the loyal toast, "The Church" was proposed by Mr. Ian H. Oram, who said that whilst all present were not members of the society all were members of the Church. Although the daily press seemed to delight in distorting the facts about church affairs, that it was difficult to know what to believe, there was still The Ringing World [laughter], which printed letters about the Reformation, Series II and many other aspects of church life.
Mr. Oram spoke of Christian stewardship, which had three objects-time, talents and money. Taking them in reverse order, he spoke of the society's Bell Restoration Fund that has been in existence just over a year. As a charity it has the facility of increasing its income through covenanted donations, and yet in its first year only six members have signed deeds of covenant. "There must be here today at least 100 members," he added; "suppose each covenanted to give 1 p per day: with tax remission the total for the year would be just short of $£ 600$."
Among the members there was considerable talent, some of which had recently been used in the work being done at Christ Church, Spitalfields, of which more would be heard later.
Time was perhaps among the most precious of commodities. Many gave of it to help on church councils, in organising events and other activities. That evening they were delighted and honoured to welcome the Rev. Austen Williams, now in his 16 th year at St. Martin's-the church which
was possibly one of the most used in the country. He coupled the name of the Rev. Austen Williams with the toast, which he invited the company to honour.

## NOT A WEALTHY CHURCH

Thanking the proposer and them all for the warmth of the greeting, the rector of St. Martin's said he felt very moved by what had been happening between the Cumberland Youths, his own church and other churches in London. Many people imagined St. Martin's as a wealthy church. This was not so. There was at times much money subscribed to help the unfortunates who were ever present in and around St. Martin's, but the church itself did not have large sums donated to it and was in the same pecuniary state as were many other churches today. There was $£ 75,000$-worth of valuable silver and plate locked away in the bank vaults which were not accessible but the church did not live by possessing valuable things. The real treasures of the church are quite other than that.
One of the things which had appealed to him (the speaker) was the closer working relationships which were happening in London and elsewhere - the work of restoration and the awareness of the condition of the churches today. The bellringers were not only simply ringing the bells but were taking a real part in the life of the church and taking a lead to bring back vitality, eagerness and zest in the church. There will be heard soon in Spitalfields something which has not been heard for a very long time-the sound of their own bells, and this mainly through the work of the members of the society.

The Church was today a very real thing. This kind of work was being done in London and elsewhere too. The opportunity that evening of speaking to the bellringers and speaking for the Church, which in many ways was in difficulties, but was much more genuine for being in difficulties, and to say from that Church: "Thank you very, very much for all you do for and in the service of God."

## EXPLORATORY WORK

Mr. Pipe, rising to propose the toast of "The Society", said that there was a possibility that the society was even older than 225 years-which they were celebrating this year. Exploratory work now going on was most exciting and it would no doubt be related in future editions of The Ringing World. He did not intend to speak on the history of the society but on the present and, more important, the future of it. He was impressed by the conduct of the society and its identity with the Church. It was still necessary to have good behaviour, good belfrymanship, good representation, and still to enjoy ringing at the same time, and this was epitomised by the Cumberlands. In addition there was the involvement within the Exercise--at the Central Council and the contribution made through and in the ringing world; the standard of ringing, of performance, the variety and the breakinc of new ground by the society. There was an expansive outlook within the Cusnberlands, although he was rather alarmed recently when a headline in the Financial Times caught his eye: "Cumberland In Danger of Over - Development" [laughter]. Mr. Pipe applauded the work spearheaded by the society-the Shoreditch job was a splendid one and at Spitalfields it was amazing what was being done. There was, he said, so much still needing to be done: St. Magnus, Pimlico, Hammersmith, All Hallows, Undershaft, and so many more - rings which in the past had made history and now, sadly, requiring work to be done on them. The Cumberlands would, he felt certain, take an active lead in that work-a wonderful thing.

## Dedication

## ST. GILES', SOUTH MYMMS

The new ring of six together with an early 16th century sanctus bell were dedicated on January 22 by the Bishop of Edmonton. After an absence of nearly 18 months the bells rang out over South Mymms immediately after they had been blessed, and during the service the Bishop gave a short address in which he mentioned several individuals who made the new ring possible.
Firstly, the Parish of St. Lawrence, Brentford, who presented South Mymms with their six bells, of which the 4th and 5th are now part of the new ring, plus the histhric pre-Reformation bell dating from about 1515 and which is to be used as a sanctus and service bell. Thanks also went to Mr. Geoffrey Dodds, who first told South Mymms about the redundant bells at Brentford and suggested that valuable use could be made of them, and to Mr. Ronald Clouston for devising a method by which the two rings could be combined. Unfortunately, neither the treble of South Mymms nor Brentford were suitable, which necessitated a new treble, which was given by Mrs. Lane in memory of her husband, Mr. Charles Lane.

The curator and business manager of Washington Cathedral in a letter to Mr . Fred Price (Southbourne) said the silencers were seldom put on the bells now and he attributed this to the excellent striking which is now usually attained.

The late Maurice Hodgson, whose obituary was in our last issue, fearned to ring at the age of 14 at Earlsheaton, Yorks, and a year later rang his first peal there-Kent T.B. Major, which was his own composition! He rang about 100 peals in a variety of methods up to 9 -spliced.

Commemorating the 25 years' ministry of the Rev. Geoffrey L. Edwards, vicar of St. Peter's, Mile End, and Rural Dean of Rickmansworth, and his induction to All Saints', Hockerill, on February 3, a quarter of P.B. Triples, was rung at Rickmansworth. Taking part in the quarter was the Rev. M. C. King, curate at St. Peter's, who rang the 5th.

Mr. Albert Coates, who died recently at Whitby, Yorks, was in his mid-80's and had rung there all his life. His name appeared in a peal of P.B. Major on March 19, 1911, which was published in the first issue of The Ringing World.

Enthusiasm was shown by two 11 -year-old ringers from Horsell (Surrey) recently, who when they heard that the bells of Old Woking (three miles away) were being taken down for overhaul at the bellfoundry, got permission from the headmaster of their school to have a morning off to see the bells lowered. They walked the three miles each way in pouring rain and were thrilled to have been present at the lowering of the tenor. (The boys' mothers also went and were persuaded by their sons to climb the ladders to see the bell frame.)

Liss (Hampshire) Handbell Ringers were heard on Radio Solent on January 30. They played several pieces, and, in between, the captain and leader was interviewed and gave details of the team (five girls, one lad and three older members with 50 handbells and an accordion). It is their sixth year. The programme is called "Sounds of the South."

## COUNTY BOUNDARIES

Dear Sir,-I was wondering how long it would be before someone raised the question of county boundaries in view of the proposed changes in local government, but I'm afraid nothing we say, either as ringers or individuals, will have any effect.

As an example, here in Somerset there is a great row going on about the formation of a new county of Avon, centred on Bristol, and taking in much of South Gloucestershire and North Somerset. A county council referendum has been held here in the north, at which 85 per cent. of the population have opted to stay in Somerset, but it isn't going to make one iota of difference, as in to-day's local Press statutory notices have appeared giving details of new electoral wards and boundaries in the new county.

We are lucky ringing-wise, because Somerset's civil and ecclesiastical boundaries are almost the same, so as a diocesan association we can afford to ignore the politicians. However, if we were a county association I would fight tonth and nail for the retention of present boundaries, partly on sentimental grounds, but also for the very practical reason that most people, I believe, have strong loyalty to the association they are in at present, and officers don't wish to grapple with arbitrary changes purely because the government decide to redraw boundaries

The answer is simple. If, as ringers, we like our boundaries as they are, let us keep them. If neighbouring county associations at their A.G.M.'s agree to accept the new civil boundaries, then all well and good.

We could, I suppose, replace county by diocesan associations, but this is a hardy annual which invariably produces arguments. In any case in these changing days who knows how long even their boundaries will last.-Yours, etc.,

Dear Sir,-With regard to Mr. Strachey's letter (R.W., p. 88) as to the possible effect it may have on our ringing associations if the proposed revision of county boundaries takes place, the following may be of interest.

About 70 years ago, when the County of London was formed, Greenwich, Deptford, Lewisham, Lee, Woolwich and Eltham were taken away from Kent and included in the new County of London. At the same time the Diocese of Southwark was created, and these towers were taken out of the Dincese of Rochester and placed in the new diocese. The nave of the Church of St, Saviour, Southwark, was rebuilt and it became the Cathedral.

For 20 years or so as far as ringing was concerned the change made no difference because the clergy did not easily forget their old allegiance to Rochester or the ringers to Kent. With the passing of those who knew the old order, clergy and ringers, it has become increasingly difficult for the Kent County Association to arrange peals
and meetings at most of these towers, although with the exception of Lee and St. Nicholas', Deptford, which now have no bells, they are still affiliated to the K.C.A.

With the formation of the Greater London Council some four or five years ago we have since lost another large part of Kent. Although our postal address is still "Kent" we are at present "stateless persons." thirteen of our towers, including my own, being neither in Kent nor London.

In the first change-over, the Surrey Association were affected far worse than we were. I can think of at least nine towers they lost in S.E. London alone, which included one 12 and two 10 's (three 10 's if one counted that which is unringable at Horsleydown). Yours, etc.,

## 25 YEARS AGO

Taken from The Ringing World for February 14, 1947
Of the listening community who replied to a questionnaire issued by the Listeners' Research Department of the B.B.C. on the Christmas Day broadcasting, the King's speech was placed first with 58 per cent., while second was Christmas bells with 30 per cent.
An exciting five minutes was experienced during the lowering of the bells at the end of a meeting at Eastwood, Nottinghamshire. The breaking of a clapper startled the man on the tenor so much that he made straight for the door, leaving the rope to lash itself around the electric fittings, tearing the wire and bulb away from the sockets and putting the tower in darkness.
The following Important Notice appeared in a prominent position: The Editor regrets that at the order of the Government through the fuel emergency the next two issues of The Ringing World, in common with all other periodicals, will be suspended.

## 40 YEARS AGO

## February 12, 1932

The death was recorded of the Rev. $H$. Law James, vicar of Surfleet, and one of the outstanding personalities of the ringing Exercise. Among his achievements was the formation of the Lincoln Diocesan Guild in 1899; from then until his death he filled the office of ringing master. He will be remembered most for his work in composition; he was one of the greatest composers the Exercise has ever had.

In the report of the diamond jubilee celebrations of the Oxford University Society, Harry Miles was referred to "as a kind of perpetual 'father' to the youth of the society."
In 1931 the Suffolk Guild rang peals in 13 different Surprise Major methods.
