## Strong sense of history at the College Youths Dinner

All College Youths Dinners are splendid affairs and the 348th Anniversary Dinner held once again in the magnificent surroundings of The Porter Tun Room, Chiswell Street on Saturday 2nd November was no exception. This one was perhaps even more special and the highlight of the evening was without doubt the presence as chief guest of honour of Mr. Edward P. Duffield

Mr. Duffield was Master of the Society 50 years ago. His reputation as a magnificent heavy bell ringer is legendary. He rang with the William Pye band and in 1937 rang the tenor single handed at St. Paul's Cathedral. This quiet unassuming gentleman provides a link with the Master of 100 years ago with whom he rang and how good it was to see him present to receive the toast to "The master of 50 years ago" and to receive a standing ovation from the 280 members, visitors and guests present at the 1985 Dinner.

During the course of the evening it was also good to see the spritely veterans with over 50 years membership of the Society taking wine with the Master. Wilfred Williams, Frank Haynes, Jack Crampion, Jim Prior and Roger Wettenhall were those present who had completed 50 years and that bright eyed duo Charles Kippin and Frank Darby joined Ted Duffield as those members with over 60 years membership. In his speech the Secretary also read a letter of greetings from Mrs. Gladys Barker writing on behalf of her husband Arthur D. Barker who joined the Society in 1908 and still, at the age of 95, takes a keen interest in the affairs of the Society and of ringing in general.

As far as is known it was unique to have the Master of 50 years ago present at a Dinner. It was also unique to have a husband and wife present as Masters respectively of The Ancient Society of College Youths and The Society of

Royal Cumberland Youths. Only the Dean of St. Paul's was brave enough to mention the fact that there was a lady present at the Dinner—other speakers preferred to speak of her as "Master of The Cumberlands" or an "honoured guest". However, the welcome was none the less warm for all that and Gwen Rogers was congratulated on her election as Master of The Society of Royal Cumberland Youths.

Mr. Philip Rogers, Master, proposed the toast to "The Church". he spoke of the various problems experienced by The Church these days with controversies and differences occasionally highlighted by sensational Press coverage. In a thoughtful and stimulating speech he described ringers as not necessarily the wisest voice of the Church but certainly the loudest and spoke of the sound of bells as a source of hope for so many.

The Very Revd. Alan Webster, Dean of St.

The Very Revd. Alan Webster, Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral, replied to the toast. He spoke warmly of the magnificent effort of restoration carried out by The Society at St. Sepulchre's. These days The Church is taking risks and making changes and must continue to do so in the future. The possibility of women being ordained is under discussion and who knows there might be an all women peal on the bells at Canterbury Cathedral – after all those bells are only little teeny weeny ones, not like those of St. Paul's! The Dean concluded by reminding all, of the reason for ringing – a demonstration that we stand for Good, proclaim God and an expression of belief in The Spirit.

The toast to "The Ancient Society of College Youths" was proposed by the Rev. Brooke Lunn. He had apparently been accused of "lowering the tone" at the very first Dinner he had attended (in 1953) and was very surprised to have been invited to speak at the 1985 Dinner. He spoke of the high standards of ringing which

were in force in years past and put in a plea for more concentration on the sound we as ringers make – to ring "pleasing to the ear" methods and compositions, and to ensure that people can actually hear the bells. In conclusion he urged members to remember just what it meant to be a College Youth and the great heritage of The Society.

As is traditional the reply to this toast was given by The Secretary of The Society. Mr. Andrew Wilby gave a racey account of the year's activities which had of course included the major restoration project at St. Sepulchre's. Vivid and totally inaccurate descriptions of the cricket matches held during the year were given and mention was made of The Society's "first" at the Twelve Bell Striking Contest at Canterbury. Dressed in period costume six members had rung three extents on the big six at Southwark to mark the occasion, 300 years ago, when this had first been achieved. A splendid country weekend had been held in Newcastle and Durham and special dinners had been held in London, one to raise funds and one to say farewell to Canon Gerald Hudson to mark his retirement from Bow. In peal ringing personal milestones had been reached by Chris Kippin and Ted Colley (1,000 peals) and during the last 12 months 58 peals had been rung for The Society. the highlights being 36 Spliced S. Maximus rung first at Leicester then at Shoreditch.

The response to the toast was given by the Rev. Edward Rogers. Mentioning that the last named on a variety show was normally the star of the proceedings he used as his reference Gower's "Guide to Plain English" to ensure that his speech was limited to the essentials only – to thank the Society on behalf of all the guests for yet another splendid dinner and occasion.

Final toasts of the evening were proposed by The Master and drunk in silence to the memory of the Masters of 300, 200 and 100 years ago. These were:

So ended an excellent evening. The officers' pleas for more support had been answered with an increase in attendance of 60 over last year, the inclusion in the menu of handbell ringing (Littleport Court Maximus by Paul Mounsey, Graham Firman, David Sheppard, Quentin Armitage, Clarke Walters and Robert Newton) was very much appreciated. The chime has been listed in very nearly all editions of "A Bellringer's Guide to the Church Bells of Britain" and "Ringing Peals of the World", and appears under Newport, Gwent, on p. 130 of the current sixth edition. Our apologies of course to Mr. Dove for printing this incorrect informa(following the success of the Surprise Major experiment), and the delayed Triples and Major book from the Education Committee.

Prices were discussed and increases on selected items agreed. It was also decided to approach association branches direct to encourage the establishment of local bookstalls.

New members John Couperthwaite and Ron Johnston were given a remit to review the range of Central Council publications to see whether the needs of the Exercise are being met. They would welcome (via The Ringing World office) any ideas for improvements, and any ideas for publications not currently available - they are due to report back to the next committee meeting on 16th February, 1986.

One new idea discussed was a "ringers atlas" showing locations of towers. For this and some other publications it might be possible to establish links with commercial organisations and this possibility is being investigated.

## Letters

### The Rolls of Honour

As Trustee of the Central Council's Rolls of Honour (a post I have held for about ten years), I was very interested to read Mr. Phillips' letter on the subject (R.W., 1/11/85, p. 928). Perhaps if he had asked me, I would have been able to answer some of his questions—although the way in which they are phrased seem to me to be unnecessarily vehement. Perhaps a brief account of how the Rolls of Honour were compiled might serve to answer some of the questions raised.

It was, I believe, in 1919 that the then Hon. Librarian of the Central Council, Rev. C. W. O. Jenkyn, undertook voluntarily to compile a list of ringers who had died for their country in the First World War. Certainly I have not found any instruction for this to be done in any Central Council minute, though I may have missed this. Mr. Jenkyn, a highly-respected gentleman, decided to communicate with the secretaries of all affiliated Guilds and Associations, asking them for lists of their former members for inclusion in the list, and by the time of the Council Meeting in 1920 had heard from all but three Associations, of which presumably the Truro Diocesan Guild was one. A list of 950 names was read aloud at the 1920 meeting. After this, Mr. Jenkyn continued to correspond and to advertise for further names at his own expense, until by the time of the 1923 meeting he evidently felt he was not going to get any further. Presumably he had still not heard from the Truro Guild. It may well be that it did occur to him to look in back numbers of The Ringing World for names, but perhaps he rejected that course on the grounds that it would be very time-consuming, that not every death on Active Service had been reported, and possibly because he did not have access to a complete set of The Ringing World for the years in question.

At the 1923 Central Council Meeting, Mr. Jenkyn, according to the official minutes of the meeting, "gave a statement on the 'Roll of Honour' with which he had been instructed to proceed. He reported that he had written to the various secretaries, and the names for the Roll now numbered about 1,100. It was for the Council to give him further instructions in this matter." The Council then agreed as to the form which the Roll of Honour should take. Mr. Jenkyn followed-up these instructions, with the result that in the following year he was able to present the Roll to the Council in its present magnificent form. At that meeting he said: "I am presenting no account for such things as postal or advertising charges, for although the task of compiling the Roll has been a hard one, I have felt it an honour to do it". The report of this meeting also states: "The President remarked that it was due from him to say how deeply the Council was indebted to the Librarian for his work in connection with the Roll. He had spent not merely hours and hours, but weeks and weeks, in trying to get everything as accurate as possible. The work had been almost superhuman

To return to Mr. Phillips' comments, I agree that it is unfortunate that the name of Arthur David Sowell, and of other Cornish ringers, does not appear, but I feel he is being unjust, to say the least, when he asks such questions as "Which member or members of the Central Council took the decision that his name should not appear?". If anyone "took the decision", it would appear to have been the then Secretary of the Truro Diocesan Guild, who apparently did not furnish the information requested of him. I am sure that the Central Council will listen sympathetically if it is put to them in a proper way that, as it has now come to light that certain names have been omitted from the Roll, it might somehow be possible to add a page recording these names.

### Acoustic tiles

How timely and interesting was David Potter's dissertation on sound control, and so well supported and commented on by D. S. Bottomley p.930.

I venture, however, to make a practical point in relation to Mr. Bottomley's lifth comment, (last paragraph) which is among the most important made for comfort and clarity in the ringing chamber. "Carpeting, seating, drapes etc", yes! but just extend it further to the application of acoustic tiles on the ringing chamber walls and possibly the ceiling. Two successful examples of wall applications are Guildford Cathedral and Isleworth, which both "control the sound once it is received" most effectively.

### Record it as 497 methods

A correction is required for the peal rung for the Ely D.A. On 2nd October 1983, as on three occasions different method names were given to half leads which proved to be opposite half leads of the same method. The peal should therefore be recorded as one in 497 methods, with 32 changes each of the methods renamed Horka, Lodz and Tygda, and 16 changes each of the remaining methods. The number of changes of method is not affected. This error had remained hidden partly because of the controversy aroused by the peal, and only surfaced when new names were given to the methods. Thanks are due to Derek Sibson for his vigilance, and apologies to all others concerned with record keeping. I understand that Derek is writing separately about the new method names

### Silly names

I notice that in the letter on p. 952 by Peter A. Lawrence the method "Boat Race Delight" is referred to. Thirty years ago when the Oxford and Cambridge people were having some kind of an argument over this method I pointed out (R.W., October 28th, 1955) that this method is really "Morning Exercise" with a pedigree some two centuries old. It is now No. 338 in T.D.M.M. There are enough stupid names given to Minor methods nowadays without foisting another on to an old-established one.

Also I noticed on p. 960 in a quarter at Bristol, Avon, another silly name has been used for a method. "Dimwit" (although the name may be appropriate in this case!). The place notation is also "dimwitian" as it does not make sense. If, as I assume, the place notation should be: 56-56.14-12-1236-14-56 l.c. 2nds 136245, then this method has already been named "Farewell", No. 2285 in T.D.M.M.

It would be a help if methods taken from T.D.M.M. were given the appropriate number so that people who keep records could check them. Cyril Wratten, I know, goes through all Minor peals and quarter peals published in the R.W in order to keep his records up to date.

### Berwick Town Hall

When living in the North of Scotland I had little opportunity to ring. However, I have just moved near to Berwick-upon-Tweed and recently took the opportunity to have a look at the bells in the Town Hall.

The ringing chamber would put many others to shame as it is well decorated and scrupulously clean, despite a constant stream of tourists during the summer months and all work being carried out on a voluntary basis.

Unfortunately the bells are in a rather sorry state and would require a considerable sum of money to make them ringable again, ever if the tower was declared safe.

Most of the wheels are broken or missing and many of the fittings are extremely corroded and unsafe. The sixth and seventh have in the distant past been well and truly broken with the crowns broken and a gaping hole left. Repairs have been made, again many years ago, by bolting on a type of skull cap. In the case of the sixth it goes right over the shoulder of the bell and up to form part of the headstock. It would also appear that some of the other crown staples have been removed, not very professionally, and could result in other bells incurring similar damage as the sixth and seventh.

The wooden frame looked reasonably sound although rather neglected. There are many ropes and hammers relating to clock chimes, chiming apparatus and manual chiming. The tourists are allowed to "ring" the bells or rather chime manually. There are eight ropes hanging in the ringing chamber but these are abbreviated some few inches below the sally. These ropes do not go round the wheels and are attached to hammers and both my three year old and five year old daughters were easily able to make the bells sound. There is also a wall mounted chiming apparatus which still works and is used for tune playing. Apart from the ominous clunk from the sixth and seventh the sound is quite pleasant.

Although there is still interest in the bells locally it would need more than enthusiasm to get the bells ringing again. A major recast and rehang is the only way to restore this presently definitely unringable ring of eight. Even if this were possible there is some doubt as to the safety of the tower fabric.

Some major work is being done to the tower and the cost has escalated three fold since the original inspection. The funds available to the trustees are very limited and being a secular ring the possibility of ever getting these bells into ringing order is very remote indeed, barring a miracle.

Should anyone require any further information I would be only too pleased to carry our further enquiries or make a more detailed inspection.

### Webb and Bennett Bellhangers

### Consistory court at Mevagissey

A consistory court was held recently at St. Peter's Church, Mevagissey, Cornwall into the faculty application by the Rector and Churchwardens to install a loudspeaker system to broadcast 15 minutes of recorded ringing prior to services. The chancellor heard petitions from four objectors and also listened to a recording of six bells ringing touches of Minor which it was proposed should be used. This was to replace a ten-bell recording which had been in use for 18 months until stopped by the Archdeacon due to the absence of a faculty. Evidence was also given by the Rector, the Archdeacon and the chairman of the Diocesan Advisory Committee who, whilst opposed in principle to the use of recordings, were less sure in this instance the majority of members having abstained from voting on the subject.

Although not making formal objections the Public Relations Officer of the Truro Diocesan Guild was present and was invited to give evidence in answer to some of the Chancellor's questions, particularly about the history of bells in the tower and also examples of other towers in the Diocese where the bells were unringable and the granting of such a faculty might be considered as a precedent.

The saddle-back tower at Mevagissey contains only a single bell cast in 1684 and carrying impressions of half-crowns of the reign of Charles II but its history is also of interest. In the reign of Edward VI a survey records three bells but a doggerel rhyme taken down by Dunkin in 1878 runs as follows:

Ye men of Porthilly (Mevagissey)
Why were ye so silly
In having so little a power
You sold every hell
So Gorran men tell
For money to pull down your tower.

It has been suggested that the bells were stolen by a neighbouring parish but at least one book suggests that they were actually sold to a St. Austell Quaker. Dunkin also records that up until about 20 years previously it had been the custom to ring a handbell around the town on Sundays prior to chiming the single bell for services although by the time of his visit this was preserved as a dinner bell in the vicarage.

To return to the petition the Chancellor's ruling, announced recently about four weeks after the court sitting, was to grant the faculty for a 12 month trial period after which the position will be reviewed.

It's happened at last! A new name appears at the number one position in the six bell section of the Lancashire Association Striking Competition, Adlington having beaten mighty Roughtown into second place, by one fault only,

The venue for this epic struggle was the lovely village of Low Bentham in the Lancaster Branch, the eight bell section held down the road at Hornby. Despite some late withdrawals from the original field of 13 teams, nine teams took part in the six bell section, and the standard of ringing was excellent indeed. The previously expressed fears that the 19 cwt, six would be too hard for many teams were quickly dispelled and many remarked upon the consistently high standard, including judge Neville Pailing from Cottingham, Humberside. Certainly Neville had some difficulty separating the winners Adlington, 41 faults, from second placed Roughtown, 42 faults, indeed Ormskirk were not far behind with 51 faults in third place. Mention must also be made of the brave young call change band from Bolton Parish Church, who will have gained valuable experience from their participation.

The eight bell section was also close, on the difficult 10 cwt. eight at Hornby. ### Obituary

### Arthur Duckett 1894-1985

Members of the Axbridge Branch (Bath & Wells DA) were sorry to hear that Arthur Duckett of Wedmore died on 25th October, aged 90.

Arthur was born in a house at Latcham on 9th November 1894 and as a small boy moved to Billings Hill. He learnt to ring at Wedmore in 1930 and was a member of the Bath & Wells Association for 48 years. He spent the last two years of his life at Badgworth Court in Somerset.

Earlier this year I met Arthur at Badgworth Court where I found a small, quiet gentleman with a wonderful sense of humour. He was quite embarrassed that I should be interested in his life as a bell ringer. Arthur welcomed us to his cosy ground floor room where he had his own furniture and a view over a window sill of potted plants, across the front lawn, to open fields. An original Bath & Wells membership certificate had pride of place on his wall, signed by The Rev. Hurst Bannister and Roger O. Fry. Arthur told us that he had a glass of dinner wine every day but he enjoyed breakfast best. We were offered a glass of sherry and settled down to look at his photographs which were all carefully labelled - Arthur said there was no point in having photographs without names on them. This is some of what Arthur had to tell us:

"I worked as a carpenter (like my grandfather) for 20 years at Axbridge. When the bells were rehung in 1925 I helped do all the carpentry in the tower. We built a special sound-proof chamber between the belfry and the ringing chamber. They went and what I call ruined that chamber by cutting a hole in it for the clock weights which wrecked the whole purpose of it. About the last job we had to do was fix the webbing end of the steel girders into the wall. I had to make the wedges so's you could push them in with your hand. If ever you're in Axbridge tower they're there now. Cause I wasn't a ringer then.

"Hearnt to ring at Wedmore in about 1930 on the 5th bell. It was difficult to keep the bells up in those days. After they were rehung in 1936/37 they were much easier to ring. We all joined the Association after that and Joe Dyke was sent as an Instructor. When he came we were supposed to be a band of ringers but at the first session he realised that none of us could ring properly. The next night ne brought rubber bands and used them to hold our hands together. That was the first thing we had to learn. We'd never heard the term striking – that didn't come into it at all! One remark Joe made was about not wanting seven bells and a tenor. He didn't say it direct to me but I knew what he meant.

" This photo was taken when we rang for the King's Silver Jubilee on May 6th 1935. I am the only one still living – there were no ladies then!

"After Joe came to teach us a lot of ringers packed in, they didn't like the criticism of their ringing. Tom Williams and I were the only ones that carried on. By 1939 we had enough to ring Bob Doubles, except me – I stayed on the tenor 'til the others were good inside, then I was to come down off the box. The war put a stop to that! Do you know we got half way through a peal once, with me on the tenor, and Joe suddenly stopped the ringing. Later when I asked if it was my fault Joe said 'No 'twas the man ringing no. 6 – the bell was beating him'. That was Brandy Fisher from Congresbury.

" I did most of the teaching of the present band at Wedmore with Tom Williams and George

Puddy. We had one team of ladies and one of men and they came on different nights! To me the girls were just as good as anybody. Margaret Redman and Marjorie Puddy are the only ones left now. After the 2nd World War we didn't have a proper conductor so John Creber and Percy Ham used to come down and help us out.

"In 1953 I got up at sunrise and we rang for Queen Elizabeth's Coronation from 3.45 to 4.45

"I went to Mears & Stainbank in 1964 to see the new treble cast, the foundry was very dirty. When the bell was rehung the man from the foundry said 'This isn't the bell you saw cast you know!"

"Up until 1963 a Death Bell was tolled at Wedmore in the following way. At the news of a death a bell was chimed twice for a lady, three times for a man. Then the tenor was rung up half muffled (fully muffled for Royalty). After a short silence it was tolled to the age of the person who had died. On the morning of the funeral each bell was chimed one to eight three times followed by the tolling of the Death Bell. At the appearance of the cortege, this morning chiming and tolling was repeated, followed by the call to the service by the chiming of the treble and tenor from the church. This Death Bell was rung for Queen Victoria and many people wept. I was the last person to ring the Death bell at Wedmore, you see it was quite a lot of work and there is no Sextant to arrange it now

"On the morning of Queen Elizabeth's Silver Jubilee in 1977 we had Rounds and Queens, one after the other. The person ringing the 2nd had a hard job holding up over the 7th and cutting back onto the treble. That was the last time I rang."

On Arthur's 90th birthday last year he had many friends to visit him and they all had to stand near a window to listen to Badgworth bells being rung in his honour.

Arthur also remembered George Prescott, Marjorie Legg, Frank Baker, Albert Cook, Jack Hesse, Tom Puddy, Arnold Teake and especially Basil Chapman who visited him at Badgworth every Saturday.

### Robert Fox Mills

We are sorry to report the sad loss of Bob Mills of Shelford, Notts., who passed away on 13th September, after a prolonged illness and much suffering.

Bob began his ringing career at East Bridgford in the mid 1920s, taking the well worn route from choir to the belfry, when the voice could no longer reach the treble he tried his hand with the rope; this he did for the next decade.

Disaster struck in May, 1939 when he was involved in a serious road accident, which necessitated some 13 months in hospital and for the next 15 years, hospital treatment became an almost annual event.

It was not until the 1950s that Bob got back into ringing, when a new band was formed at Shelford. Since that time he has remained an active member in the art until the last few months. Bob was what one might call a stalwart of the art, for although he was never able to ring peals as a result of his accident, being unable to stand for any length of time, he was always present on Sundays for service ringing and always ready to help on practice nights.

In the 1960s and early 70s he rang in a considerable number of quarter peals and also enjoyed many outings and ringing tours. He was immensly pleased and proud to ring with his grandsons in the Shelford team, when they managed to win the Tom Goodwin Trophy in the Bingham District Striking Competition.

In spite of the many problems in his life, Bob was always cheerful when one met him and always ready for a joke and leg pull, he will be greatly missed by all who knew and loved him especially at Shelford.

The funeral took place on the 18th September 1985 and his ashes were later interred at East Bridgford, near his family grave in accordance with his last wishes. May he rest in peace.

# A chime in Rottnest, a ring in

York

A long awaited event took place at 3.30 p.m. on Saturday 21st September, 1985 when the bells rang forth from Holy Trinity Church at York.

This project concluded a week of achievement for me, as on the previous Wednesday a chime of eight bells was installed at Holy Trinity Church on Rottnest Island, thanks to the assistance of the American Navy.

### Difficult problem

The Rottnest bells were purchased by the parish priest Father O'Shea from Whitechapel, then the problem arose as to who was to construct the frame, mount the bells, or erect them in the tower. I was finally approached, and all the work was done through the W.A. Institute of Technology. The bell tower which was too small for the new ring had to be partially demolished, and additional steel work added The installation was not an easy matter as the Church sits on top of a sand dune, and has no access other than a pathway and steps, and the distance from the road to the tower was 7.5m with many trees in between. The crane was out of the question due to the high cost of conveying it to the island from the mainland. This was when Father O'Shea suggested using the American Navy when it was next in Fremantle, to use a helicopter to lift the frame and bells onto a platform adjacent to the tower.

### Tower in danger

Everything was planned, new steelwork erected, and it was proposed to leave steelwork exposed until the bells had been securely bolted in, then the brickwork and roof capping was to be finished off. However, one zealous builder decided to complete the brickwork and let us winch the bells from the platform into the vacant hole. Anyway, at 1.30 p.m. on the Wednesday a helicopter carrying the # ton load



appeared from the sea with bells duly slung underneath, and with much dust flying, the American dogman instructed the pilot on lowering the load onto the platform. One moment of great concern came when the load started to swing towards the tower, some two ft. away, but quick action by the dogman put himself between the suspended load and the tower, and everything came back under control

The bells were finally winched into the hole, but had to use a "micro hoist" to get in the two inch gap left between the top of the bell frame and the tower supporting frame. By 6 p.m. all was finished, and only some wiring to do between the chiming apparatus and the


of the EBSB and the deputy master, Jeffery Birt proposed the toast to the Church. Stanley Darmon, branch chairman kept a firm control on the proceedings. A dinner day peal of Cambridge Maximus was rung at High Wycombe with a band of branch members. Patricia Newton being the conductor.

An enjoyable evening was had by all and it is now hoped to have a regular branch dinner at least once every two years.

### Church bells to wake them up

On the 20th-22nd September, B.U.S.C.R. enjoyed an excellent ringing weekend in Bristol, organised by their Ringing Master, Fiona. Accommodation was on a church hall floor with a bell from the church to wake us up! A "grab" was organised for the Saturday, then a meal, and a drink at a Jazz Pub in the evening. On Sunday morning we rang with the local ringers at Bristol Cathedral, St. Stephen's and Christchurch. Then, lunch for the survivors at another pub boasting live music.

A visiting American who ordered an "Old Fashioned English Breakfast" at a Sussex hotel learned, on enquiry, that he had eaten Irish bacon, French eggs, Italian tomatoes, Danish crispbread, Hungarian marmalade and New Zealand butter. The waiter was Spanish.



York was a much easier exercise, having previously gutted the tower, the base frame was lowered in by crane, and levelled on its pads. The upper frame with bells, was then dropped in and bolted to bottom frame. A large block of concrete has now been cast in the base to keep everything steady.

Two days have now been spent aligning bells, fixing wheels etc., with our "trade assistant" Laith Reynolds frequently running down to the local hardware store in his "Merc", to get us nuts bolts etc. All now works well, but having new ropes, and the front three bells weighing just over one cwt., (tenor 4½ cwt.) we are still getting used to handling them. The frame has minimal movement, much less than St. George's and the general opinion is that the steel frame concept, standing independent of the rest of the tower has been demonstrated to be

Thanks must be extended to our Structural Designer Jack Portas, unfortunately not a ringer, who wrestled with the design problems associated with swinging bells, to design us a sturdy frame and setting a new trend in independent bell frames.

Many thanks must also be given to all those other ringers that have supported Laith and me to get this unique ring of bells in operation.

### York officially opened

At last, the bells of Holy Trinity Church, York, Western Australia are well and truly hung and rung. A large contingent of Perth ringers and their families were present at the official opening on the morning of Saturday the 5th October when the W.A. Minister for the Arts spoke warmly of bells and bellringing which he admitted enjoying. His office is very close to St. George's Cathedral, Perth and he often hears the bells practising. His remarks gave us much hope that other rings could also be funded on a dollar for dollar basis by grants from the Lotteries Commission.

During the afternoon there were plenty of touches of Stedman, Grandsire, Plain Bob, Kent and Cambridge whilst we got used to the very light 4 cwt. eight. There are still one or two problems to solve such as very finely set stays. stretchy ropes plus some additional refinements still to happen to improve sound control.

### Band being formed

A strong band spent the night at York so that the bells could be rung for morning service. The first quarter peal rung on the bells was of Plain Bob Minor and after a barbecue lunch, the ringers explained the art to about 30 locals. Initial training sessions are being held on some Thursday evenings with about eight being taught to handle. It is envisaged that the bells be rung monthly for morning service with a practice session afterwards until the local band is strong enough to ring alone.

York is a small town of about 2000 people and the interest shown in the bells is very encouraging. The bells were exhilarating to ring, after throwing your weight about on Perth bells, it is a pleasure to be able to concentrate on the method with striking coming naturally. York is already a major tourist attraction mainly because time (and the railway line) passed it by. But with a ground floor ring of bells visible through the lancet windows in the tower. another major attraction has been added to the reason for a visit.

The grand finale was at the "curry house at Wootton Bassett", who coped admirably with a party of 18 ringers at very short notice.

### Early bellfounding in Lincolnshire

## An early Lincolnshire bellfounder

The following document is recorded in the muniments of the Dean and Chapter of Lincoln Cathedral.

'Carta feofamenti Jacobi de Normanby de vno tofte in Clakesby cum pastura Sciant presentes futuri quod ego Jacobus filius sacerdotis de Normannebi dedi concessi hac presenti mea carta confirmaui deo beate Marie commune canonicorum Linc' ecclesie unum toftum in Clakesbi scilicet illud quod Raduffus le belleiectare tenuit in eadem uilla pasturam iiii or bobus quadraginta ouibus uni ego in puram perpetuam elemosinam liberam quietam solutam ab omni seculari seruitio exactione Et ego Jacobus heredes mei waranti zabimus predicte ecclesie supradictum toftum contra omnes homines Teste Philippo subdecano magistro Johanne de Tinemue Willelmo de Aualun canonicis Radulfo le Curtais Ricardo de Braibof Galfrido de Normannehi multis aliis

This relates to the grant (circa 1206-1214) by "James the sone of the priest of Normanby to the church of Lincoln" of a house "in Claxby with pasture for four oxen, forty sheep and one horse occupied by Ralf the bellfounder." Claxby is a small village in north Lincolnshire between Market Rasen and Grimsby. So far as 1 can discover this bellfounder has not ben reported previously and an examination of the list of bellfounders in Walters' "Church Bells of England" seems to indicate that few founders are known of so early a date. I should be pleased to have comments of those better qualified than I in this subject.

### The Lincoln bell founders

On 28th April 1299 Walter de Carlide of Lincoln goldsmith granted to William le Bellegeter of Lincoln "all his land with buildings in the parish of Holy Trinity atte kleumarkett within the walls . . . situated between land of William towards the east and land of Gilbert de Leycestre le Cuteller towards the west extending from the highway north to land of Gilbert south". !

### First from present band

Caroline Cuthbertson became the first of the present Inverness Cathedral ringers to ring a peal recently whilst staying with friends in Derby. She made a creditable job, particularly bearing in mind the lack of opportunity for practice in the far north, of ringing the second at Brassington to a peal of Bob Minor.

### Blow Bells?

After the first round, Alan started collecting bottles and glasses of water. With John's aid they "poured" bottles that blew the tones of the venerable bells of Old North - at least when blown by those skilled in bottle music. Some required training in the handling of their "bell', those dulcet sounds being frequently lost in fits of wheezing and giggles. Handling practice over (surely it is easier to master the art of imbibing the contents), we attempted rounds. Jeannie obligingly called changes from the sidelines. The final challenge was to blow plain hunt on eight. The striking, however, was so uneven that four members of the band determined that bottles, being hand-held instruments, ought to be "rung" double-fisted. An improvement. But as all evenings must end, the "bells" were cleared away and emptied. Will bottles in '86 reproduce the tones of the bells of Victoria?

In 1340 a tax known as "Taxatio Nonarum" was levied on all citizens by the King and amongst those so taxed in Lincoln was William Belgetter who was possessed of goods valued at 18s of which he had to pay 2s tax.5

In 1349 Beatrice daughter of William Belgetter granted to her husband John de Maynham all that tenemant which she had by will of her father William.<sup>2</sup>

In his will made in 1360 John Mayson potter after providing for his wife Beatrice directed that his property in Holy Trinity was to be sold and the money given for masses.<sup>3</sup>

A grant dated 5th April 1363 of a messuage ... in Holy Trinity atte Clewmarkettd describes it as being situated "between a tenement of Peter once of John de Maysham of Lincoln belgeter on the east....4" etc.

All this seems to indicate that there was a bell-foundry in Lincoln c.1299-1363 which was situated where the Co-op stores now stands somewhere in the area bounded by Silver Street, Freeschool Lane, Bank Street and the old cemetery of St. Swithin's.

Andrew White in *The Ringing World* dated 6th January 1978 (p.21) reported the existence of Robert Clerke who was in business in 1502 as a bellfounder. As he lived in the parish of St. Swithin's which at some early date absorbed the parish of Holy Trinity it might be that further research will reveal continuity.

### Lincoln Cathedral – The Lady Bells

When the will of Dom Richard Baylei was proved on 25th April 1534 "iiij bellringers" received "xijd". Up to this time ringers were appointed to bells number one, two or three and no mention is made of a fourth bell. At the Bishop's visitation on 16th May 1580 the following four ringers are named: John Pyeborne, Henry Drew, Nicholas Wodhall and Thomas Mellyn. Three years later (25th May 1583) at a further visitation the same ringers were still in office.

This seems to indicate that the four bells cast by Quernbie and Oldfield in 1593 were recasts of existing bells and that augmentation at this time did not take place.

It is interesting to note that two of the four bells at the old church of St. Michael-on-the-Mount were also cast in 1593 by Quernbie and Oldfield the two tenors being cast in 1578 by "JB." The four bells were sold in 1739 prior to the building of the present church. Readers may like to know that St. Michael's churchyard has featured in the current TV serial "Oliver Twist" the workhouse being the old Blue Coat School which is on the other side of Christ's Hospital Terrace.

I am most grateful to Chris Johnson of the Lincoln Archives Office for assistance with research in connection with the Lincoln Bellfounders.

### Bishop's move

The Enthronement of the Right Reverend Barry Rogerson as Bishop of Bristol caused quite a stir in the City and Diocese on Saturday 5th October. Like the Queen of Sheba he came with a very great train, the "Episcopuffer" no less - the name bestowed on one of British Rail's 125 High Speed diesel sets following a competition to name the train organised by the Archdeacon of Swindon. All the goings on at ground level have been duly reported in The Church Times and local press but it seems incredible that the reporters failed to notice the great bells of Redeliffe ringing their quarter of Cambridge Maximus as, led by the Church Lads and Girls Band, the procession made its way from Temple Meads to the Cathedral where a splendid peal of Bristol came round shortly before the Bishop reached College Green. The bells of St. Stephen and St. John the Baptist rang as the "train gang" passed by Neptune's Statue and climbed the hill leading to the Cathedral so the band did not have things all their own way!

With the Bishop of Gloucester the Bishop of Bristol is invited to serve as Joint President of the Gloucester and Bristol Association and in addition to the activities in Bristol at the time of the enthronement, bells in both Dioceses rang to welcome the new Bishop reminding an audience far larger than the thousand or so in the Cathedral to pause and pray for Bishop Barry as he took up his responsible task at a significant point in the life and history of both church and diocese. Having originally been in the Diocese of Worcester the Diocese of Bristol was for a time in the 19th century united with that of Gloucester - an "economy measure" it is said, to permit formation and representation in the House of Lords of the new Dioceses of Manchester and Ripon - which union explains the Association's double barrelled title. A pity perhaps that some enthusiastic band did not select "Union Bob" to mark the occasion.

## Cured – the bell that lost its voice

In the early days of October, the Portsmouth News reported that the single bell of St. Philip's, Cosham (north of the city) had lost its voice as a result of a seized up clapper. Normally, the residents should hear the bell ring out for morning and evening prayers each day, but now "No matter how hard the rope is tugged, our poor bell cannot toll" said the Vicar sadly. "In earlier years, if the bell failed to ring, a retired foreman builder used to climb straight up extended ladders and put the matter right in no time, but he died this year and no one else is keen on heights." Two brave parishioners did try to reach the bell by a less frightening route, involving ladders on the vestry roof, but the ladders proved too short and the attempt had to be abandoned.

However, a happy sequel to the sad story was published a few days later. The first article was read by Mr. Sydney Stacey, a local building and rooling contractor. "As soon as I heard about this little difficulty, I said to myself, "No problem, that's a job for Gary!" The bell is difficult to get at in its outside turret, but Mr. Stacey reckoned that if anyone could fix it, his employee, roofer Gary Goodeve (23), was the man. A few hours later, Mr. Goodeve was parked outside St. Philip's with his mate, Brett Salt, and all the necessary gear, and in no time at all, the bells clapper was freed and lubricated. The Vicar joyfully rang a very warm thankyou to the *News* and the contractors who did the work free.

All who rang felt both proud and honoured to be able to play a part in this very notable occasion and it is their confident hope that Bishop Barry will feel that he has in the Association a host of friends who remembered him in their prayers as with their bells they praised God for his appointment in "Gloucester and Bristol".

### QUARTER PEAL REPORT FOR OCTOBER 1985

For a change I give "Front Page Towers" first.

When the vicar moved to Bramley, Surrey in 1980 the bells were silent (p.841) – well not quite. There was a quarter in 1964 and one for each of the years 1976 to 1979. The new vicar revived interest in the bells, for in 1980 three quarters were published and this was equalled again in 1984. The intervening years all had two thus giving

a total of 19.

The edition of 18th October mentions four towers: Eversley; Pott Shrigley; Holy Trinity, Guildford; and St. Mary-le-Bow, London, Eversley has not had any quarters rung on their two bells (or have they?!) and I know of none while they were a four. So when they become a ring of six it will be the first on the bells. Pott Shrigley has had one quarter of Singles rung in the middle of last year. Holy Trinity, Guildford, have 87 being well spread over the years although there was a silence of six over the years although there was a silence of six years from 1969. The last tower on this page, St. Mary-le-Bow, London have four. Cambridge Major in 1968, Grandsire and P.B. Doubles in 1969, Grandsire Triples in 1971 but I did not record what was rung in the 1983 quarter.

From the report given about Pen Selwood, it is not surprising that no quarters have been rung here but after augmentation this may soon be rectified. There was no tower for the edition of 25th October

## Wicken peal marked with quarter

The first peal on the bells at Wicken, Northants took place on 4th November, 1905 and consisted of 5040 changes of Grandsire and Antelope Doubles. That peal was also the first for the then-named Towcester Association.

In a quarter to mark the 80th anniversary of the peal the treble was rung by George Green, grandson of George Green who who rang the treble in the peal and J. Green rang the 4th (he is the great grandson of T. Green who rang the 4th in the peal). W. Yates and George Holland are long serving Wicken ringers while P. Keens and T. Green are recent recruits. R. Yates and Claire Yates are son and daughter-in-law of W. Yates.

This combination of old and new repeated in part the considerable achievements of 80 years ago.

### The big haul at Pucklechurch

"Following the Flower Festival (in Mid September as previously reported) much preparatory work, including painting the whole frame, was carried out in the tower under the expert guidance of the Northavon Branch Secretary (G & B), Steve Slocombe. The preacher and celebrant, at the Parish Communion Service on Sunday, 27th October, the Bishop of Malmesbury (Rt. Rev. Peter Firth) blessed the Recast tenor Bell (now weighing 12.1.14) as it stood, by the font, at the back of the church.

On the following Saturday, all preparatory work having been completed, a small crowd gathered in the vestry, underneath the tower, to watch the tenor being hauled up. At the stroke of 10.00 a.m., the Vicar, the Rev. J. D. O. Hinton, said a prayer before the big haul began. with much bated breath all round. By 11.30 a.m., on Saturday 2nd November, the tenor bell was in position and the local press photographer had taken his photographs. It then remained to replace the 2nd and 3rd bells, together with their mutual frame side in position. By 5.00 p.m. all the heavy work had been done and the workers were indebted to the Vicar for offering to pay for their welcome lunch break, taken in the local Wadworth's inn, the Rose and Crown! A very interesting and well spent day was had by all.

It now remains for all three bells to be aligned, bolted down and have their wheels and ropes replaced. There is still much work to be done but the day of the **big haul** will not easily be forgotten."
