## 13 August 1987-150th anniversary of a famous ring

The Town
Where is Norbury? It may seem strange to newcomers to the district that, although there is a Norbury Church, there does not appear to be any defined village or place of that name. This has come about because the Industrial Revolution not only created Hazel Grove and the church and parish of Norbury, but also brought to an end the ancient township system of local government. The civic administration was in the hands of the four townships of Bosden, Bramhall, Norbury and Torkington, part of whose boundaries met in the proximity of the London Road. With the formation of the Hazel Grove and Bramhall Urban District Council in 1900 these townships lost their individual authority. This factor, combined with changes in the ecclesiastical boundaries, has led to the present parish of Norbury only vaguely resembling the township of that name.
The Church
Probably the first Christians were living on the edge of the Macclesfield Forest before William the Conqueror landed on this island Some ancient documents (states Norman Turner in his book on Norbury Parish Church) suggest that there may have been a preaching cross or broadoak in Norbury as carly as 1005 AD. The first records of religious life which we have start in 1465. In September of that year Hamnet Hyde, the Lord of the Manor, was granted a licence to build a private chapel in the township. No mention of the Norbury chape! can be found after 1511 until the end of that century, probably because not only did Henry VIII suppress the monasteries but he closed private chapels also. The chapel struggled on under different elergy until the arrival of the Rev. Jacob Picton who set about the task of raising the sum of $£ 6000$ to build a new church. The Church Commissioners granted £2000 and instructed a firm of architects in Manchester, Hayley and Brown, to draw up plans for one of their "Waterloo" churches at a cost of $£ 3000$ of which it was said that one of their chief characteristics was "unmitigated ugliness and hopeless inconvenience". The church was finally completed in May 1833 and it was consecrated on 2nd July 1834 .
The Bells
When the bells were replaced at Disley church the Orford brothers offered the old ring of six to Norbury on condition that they would raise the $£ 60$ which it would cost to have them hung in the tower. Thomas Mears who was in charge of the installation at Disley, also supervised the work at Norbury. At the same time the 5th bell was recast. On 13th August 1837 they rang out for the first time.


Life was not all sweetness and light for the ringers since on Easter Sunday 1880 they walked out. The Vicar had reprimanded them for not attending the very services to which they had summoned parishioners. The vicar recruited a new band of ringers from the senior Sunday school. The Stockport Advertiser pointed out the virtue of the new Norbury ringers. The article said "There are 100 many churches where the ringers immediately after calling others to worship, are seen to slink off in their everyday clothes to their homes or the nearest public house

From this time the regular appearance of the Norbury handbell ringers was noted in the local press, whilst the performance at the Belle Vue festival some years later earned them a creditable reputation

In 1923 the PCC, aware that the bell-frame was in need of repair, decided to seize the opportunity to recast and augment the bells. Because the ringing of the bells had been part of the Hazel Grove scene for so long it was decided to throw open the fund to the general public. The estimated cost of the project amounted to $£ 680$ plus that of a new frame. Their removal from the tower attracted many visitors, before the bells were transported to Messis. Taylor at Loughborough. The advice given was that as the third and fourth dated 1617 were such fine examples of the old bell-founders' craft, they should be preserved. These can now be seen resting on lwo beams in the lower. On their return to Hazel Grove four recast bells, along with the four new bells, were paraded around

the village on suitably decorated lorries. When they rang out on 24th October 1925, another red letter day was marked up on the calendar of the Norbury bellringers.
On the evening of 3Ist October 1975 a peal of 5056 changes of Bristol was rung on the eight bells. The occasion was the 50th anniversary of the dedication. The peal was conducted by C. Kenneth Lewis, of Dunham Massey, who rang his first peal at Norbury over 40 years ago. Appropriately the peal was composed by Ernest Bennett who for many ringers was a ringer at Norbury, but unfortunately, due to ill-health, was unable to take part. Another ringer who took part was Fred Dunkerley who was formerly a member of a band which rang many peals at Norbury. The band then adjourned to a nearby hostelry where they met Lionel Hough who took part in the very first peal on the bells. Since the dedication over 400 peals have been rung on the bells.

## A "Minor" tower of the iwenties

John Fidler, another ex-Norbury ringer, vividly remembers the celebrations which took place when the bells were dedicated. On the Saturday, following services in church. and ringing, there was a slap-up tea in the schoolroom. In his book The Story of Norbury Bells and Ringers he relates: Tuesday 4th December 1923 was a special day in the history of Norbury bells for on them was rung a peal of Treble Bob Minor, 5040 changes, in 2 hours and 42 minutes by James Fernley Jr. Treble; John P Fidler 2nd; William Fernley 3rd; W. W. Wolstencroft 4th; James Fernley Sr. Sth; John W. Hartey Tenor; conducted by James Fernley Sr. This peal contains the greatest number of methods yet rung in seven true extents. The Ringing World had much to say and Emest Morris in his History and Art of Change-ringing says "To accomplish such a wonderful performance it is essential that each ringer must have intimate knowledge of the best way of memorising and retaining the multiplicity of methods" and to this end John Fidler wrote a most comprehensive treatise on the subject in The Ringing World, since published in book form.
Prior to the augmentation of the bells in 1925, Norbury was one of the premier six bell towers

## Obituary

## Alan M. Hickman

The death occurred on June 3rd of Alan Hickman of St. Mary's, Market Drayton, at the age of 82 after a short illness.

Alan had been a ringer at St. Mary's for over 68 years, having rung his first peal (Bob Major) in November 1919, in company with Charles Lilley as conductor. Emest and William Weatherby and Edward V. Rodenhurst.

Alan was most regular in ringing for Sunday services; rarely would he miss, and over the years has taught many youngsters in handling a bell.

As he owned a grocer's shop for a number of years, Alan had not rung a great number of peals but he always enjoyed a quarter-peal.

He will be sadly missed at Market Drayton.

in the country and on its bells the "splicing" of methods was developed. At that time it was thought that 35 methods in seven extents was the limit but as the interest in method splicing increased, greater numbers of methods were introduced. In the 1920s splicing was not favoured by the diehards, and ringers of the old school tried to stop it, but without success and today ringing peals in many methods is the aim of the ambitious ringer. Despite efforts and failures that would have daunted many, we at Norbury struggled on and when success was achieved there were no swollen heads. Jim Fernley was a modest man; he had set his sights on conducting the first peal in 35 methods and having achieved his ambition he encouraged the younger ringers 10 master conducting. To him Norbury was a nursery for ringers to master conducting. To him Norbury was a nursery for ringers of the district.

A peep into some old record books held in the tower shows that in 1921 a total of $109 \times 720$ s in 37 different methods were rung by the Service Band during the year. Notable peals amongst many rung at Norbury include:

Saturday Dec. 8th 1923
A peal of Treble Bob Minor comprising Disley, Norbury, Knulsford, Wilmslow, Rostherne. Poynton and Marple.
The names of the methods in the peal represent sixbell towers in the Stockport and Bowden Branch, the methods having been first rung and named at Norbury.

Saturday April 13th 1935
A peal of Spliced Surprise Major comprising London, Bristol, Cambridge and Superlative First peal of Spliced Surprise Major in 4 methods in the county, by the Guild and by all the band.

## Group Captain R. W. Cox, DSO, DFC, AFC

Group Captain Reggie Cox died on 13 June 1987 in the Royal Hampshire County Hospital, Winchester, where he had been a patient for a short while. He was born in Stockbridge, Hants, on 12 August 1912, and joined the Royal Air Force as an aircraft apprentice in 1928.
On retirement from the RAF in 1962 he returned to Stockbridge and became interested in ringing the bells of the parish church. He did not find it easy to learn to handle a bell; this he blamed partly on having to wear tri-focal spectacles - as he put it, the sally never seems to come down quite where you think it should be: a frustration, but nevertheless he regularly rang for Sunday services and persevered on practice nights. In fact he did ring the tenor for one peal of Grandsire Doubles with a visiting band who arrived one short.

After a short while he realised that the broader interest of the Exercise could benefit if the teams of method and round ringers who were runners-up in the Andover District Annual Striking Competitions could be presented with a tangible recognition of nearly winning. He acted on this by donating two silver cups (smaller than the winner's) which have been and are now proudly held by the relevant "runners-up". The cups are suitably inscribed and identified as the Cox Runners-up Cups, and are a lasting memorial to a courageous Royal Air Force pilot.
A tribute by past and present members of the Andover District was paid on Sunday, 5 July, 1987, by ringing a half-mumed quarter peal of Doubles at Stockbridge.

On August 16th 1974 Basil Jones rang his 1000 th peal at Norbury. The method rung was Bristol Surprise Major and it was conducted by C. Kenneth Lewis of Dunham Massey who has, incidentally, conducted most of Basil's thousand peals. Basil learned to ring at Norbury and was tower captain for many years before moving to Marple.
Ringing for Sunday Service at Norbury is at $9.45 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and $6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. Practice night is on Thursdays at $7.45 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. and any ringers are made very welcome.

## Bronze mortar from <br> Whitechapel

A correspondent in Australia has written to us with an atticle which recently appeared in the Advertiser of Adelaide. A 17th century bronze mortar, probably used by an apothecary, has been bought for a South Australian museum. Bronze mortars, the article says, were used in England from the 14th century and were forged by bellfounders. The one in question was forged in 1609 in Whitechapel by Joseph Carter of a well-known family of bellfounders who made bronze mortars for 300 years. The mortar was, until recently, in the Carter family.

## In the Beginning

Much is done nowadays to improve standards of ringing by using modern teaching methods, putting on day-schools and running week-end courses. Theory sessions take place (and not just in the pub!) and ringers who are acknowledged leaders in the exercise put an enormous amount of effort into helping others to learn. It remains the case, however, that how well you ring, and more important, how well you handle, are still largely determined by chance. This is because a new recruit's first teacher will almost certainly be the Ringing Master of the tower where he happens to present himself in order to learn. In the nature of the situation it is unlikely that he knows good towers from bad before he starts, still less that he will survey the area and choose the one where the best tuition can be had. In many a tower only one person teaches, even though his own handling may be hopeless. It is not therefore surprising that, at a recent one day school, a learner though understanding the method and what she was told to do, could not do it because she had been taught handling so badly that she could not control an average bell. Since we can hardly dictate where a person shall begin to learn to ring, do we need handling clinics?

## When is a peal not a peal?

I suppose Brian Salter ( $p .660$ ) is right; we really ought not to get so excited about whether the use of the phrase "peal of bells" is "correct" or "incorrect"- certainly not so excited that we begin to insult one another. But Eric Taylor's original contribution on the subject (p.558) was forcefully expressed, and was bound to irritate a few of your readers. The use of "peal" in this context is, he tells us, a "misuse" born of "ignorance".
What authority does he have, I wonder, to support his view; who says it is "incorrect" to speak of a "peal of bells"? Whilst he is searching for an answer to this, let me draw so his attention, almost at random, three authorities which seem ranged against him:

1. R. H. Dovc's Bellringer's Guide to the Church Bells of Britain and Ringing Peals of the World interchanges the words "ring" and "peal" frecly. not only in the title but in its chapter headings. Though not entirely free from error, of course, this standard reference book must surely be treated as some authority?
2. W. G. Wilson's Change Ringing also uses "peal of bells" (e.g. illustration pp. 224/225).
3. The printed stationery used by John Taylor \& Co. lists "peals" amongst their products, alongside carillons, chimes, and clock bells
Perhaps we should just accept that the word "peal" has at least two meanings in common usage, and that both (because of their widespread usage) must be accepted as correct.
Come to think of it, I'm sure I've seen Eric Taylor ringing a bell "up in peal" - but perhaps he had another phrase for it?

## Cambridge compositions

Whilst I do not claim to be a Cambridge Major fanatic, I must confess to an interest in the many peal compositions available and try whenever possible to use a different one when called upon to conduct. In my collection I have the following 5024 attributed to C. J. Sedgley (No. 8).

I see though that I have the same composition, starting with the last Home, ascribed to J. W. Parker. Also, it is virtually the same as A. J. Pitman's 5024 which begins with Before, 4ths, In and omits the 3*
It is unlikely that the three great men collaborated on such a project but I would be interested to know if the two callings were produced independently and why Pitman's is given prominence in the CC Collection? The Sedgley/Parker version appears to be slightly better, coming close to achieving nine combination courses in full.
Whilst writing, I have the following as C. J. Sedgley (No. 9) 5088:

## Birmingham worthies

Christopher Groome's letter (p.640) mentions one or two Birmingham worthies of the period.

The peal record was quite likely to have been made and engraved by John Carter himself. He was a skilled craftsman and was by trade a revolver maker, in which field he made and patented a number of improvements. Evidence of his mechanical skill is given in his "Campana Mutaphone" now in the Science Muscum and in the trusteeship of the Central Council.

The peal report in Bell News of 26 August 1882 shows that the initials of the ringers as given are not quite correct. Thus the ringer of 1-2 was T Russam (Tom), of 5-6 was T. Miller and of 9-10 was E. Hackley. The footnote to the peal reads:
This is the second peal of Grandsire Caters ever rung in hand, and the first ever rung in the same manner in the Midiand Counties
Tom Miller was something of a character and was a connecting link with the Birmingham ringers of the mid 19th century, ringing with the St. Philip's band, later with Johnson and the Holte Society at Aston and afterwards with the St. Martin's Guild. A Roman Catholic, he was for many years in charge of the bells at St. Chad's Cathedral.

Professionally Tom Miller was a bell tuner, working first for Blews and later for Barwells. When the consistory court was held in January 1926 to consider the application to recast Coventry bells, Tom Miller was called on to give evidence and this evidence shows that he was not in favour of "Simpson" tuning. It is interesting to note that he rang in the last (false) peal rung on Coventry bells in 1883.

Born in 1858, he died in January 1950 in his 92 nd year.

## Two's good company but one's best and three's a crowd

I was interested to read Chris Woolley's remarks on judging contests (p.640). I agree with him that the only way of judging a striking contest is to grade the teams according to the number of faults, with the team with the least number being declared the winner. If the judges of the 12 -bell contest like to alter the terminology and talk about "accuracy" this amounts to the same thing (How does one assess accuracy without counting the faults?). As for the use of "impressions"; again 1 agree with Chris, the whole idea wants ditching altogether. What a farce it would have been if these impressions had affected the result! I suppose the judges "adjusted" these to make sure they didn't. which if so shows how valueless they were.

The use of three judges is, of course, a needless luxury. The proliferation of judges tends to complicate rather than clarify the issue. One, or at the most two, are all that are necessary provided they have good ears, a good sense of rhythm, some experience (not all good ringers make good judges) and self-confidence.
Although I have been judging contests since before the war (I reckon about 150 up to press although I have never actually counted them), and still adjudicate three or four yearly. I have never joined in a judges' threesome. I have, however, paired with many judges from David

Brearley of Bolsterstone to Jim Thorley of Thome (both excellent judges) but we always marked for each other, judging an estimated half of the test piece each.
Of course at the first announcement comments and observations are given but the gist of these can be written on the paper given to each team. Part of this paper can be divided into one minute rectangles into which the faults are entered as they occur and each team can so follow its progress.
The 12 -bell system of marking is an interesting experiment but there is nothing wrong with the old system: from Minor to Maximus a fault is still a fault and no amount of juggling with the system of marking can alter this. It goes without saying that the personal likes and dislikes of the judge should not show in the result; e.g. If he considers that the ringing is too quick or too slow, he may remark on this in his summary but should not criticise it unless it affects the striking and for no other reason.
For many years now I have judges contests on my own (with sometimes a marker) and I still consider that a single, competent judge gives the fairest results. If a judge reckons that he requires the assistance of one or two others in order to assess a fault or form an opinion he should not be in the judge's room!

## Impressions of ecstasy

Like Chris Woolley (p.640) I, too, now have some reservations about the awarding of "(artistic) impression" marks in striking competitions. It seems to fall into the category of those ideas which sound good but which on closed consideration are both hard to put into practice and less substantial in theory than might be supposed. As an example, a short while ago a friend and I were invited to judge a neighbouring Guild's 6 -bell competition which involved about ten teams at each of two afternoon venues, the winning two teams at each venue to go to an evening play-off. We had decided beforehand that the afternoon judging would be by faults alone but since the evening's teams would all be close as far as faults were concerned, the evening would present much more difficulty. Our strategy was therefore to announce to the four finalists at tea-time that in the event of a close finish vis-a-vis faults, the issue would be won or lost on "impression" marks added to the former
Great! Off we all went; they to ring, we to shelter from the gloom and drizzle under a magnificent copper beech nearby. However, at the end of the four test pieces any passers by could be excused for thinking they were watching the frenzied tarantella of a couple of nuts - and not the ones on the tree. Why the panic? Although the faule scores and impression marks we had both given had tallied well, there was a sudden realisation that marrying these two items was not going to be so easy; and just what did "impression" really mean anyway?
How then does one set about combining an "unconfined" or "unlimited" fault score with a "confined" or "limited" percentage impression mark? One possible answer might be to turn the
former into a centile quantity, either by rating each team's fault score as a percentage of the total faults for all teams and subtracting this from 100, or merely subtracting each team's score from 100, assuming none have scored over that figure. Even this derived percentage fault score may have to be scaled again depending on the way it is combined with the (assumed) percentage impression score. The system seems pretty scarey - see the following example

Suppose four teams have faults $20,24,26$ and 30 ; and impression percentages $60,70,80$ and 90 respectively. If one fifth ( $20 \%$ ) of the final marks were awarded for impression then under either of the possibilities in the previous paragraph the final marks would be $76,75,75$ and 74 - still in harmony with the fault scores. However, increase to one quarter ( $25 \%$ ) the contribution of impression marks and the final marks become 75, 75, 76 and 76! ... "and the last shall be first" . . OK, it's pretty hypothetical and generally speaking teams with low fault scores usually have the higher impression marks. However, when they don t , it does serve to illustrate the minefield of possibilities. What importance is an impression score to have anyway - $10 \%$ ? $50 \%$ ? I recall hearing a tale one beery night long ago of a judge who used $100 \%$, but that's another story!
Just what do we mean by "impression"?
Is it speed of ringing, i.e. slow, brisk or variable? Are not the first two merely personal preferences reflecting the prejudices of the observer and using them in isolation enough to make any marks gained in this category a bit of a lottery. Many will probably agree that bells can be rung too slowly or too quickly for pleasant listening and that either extreme (funereal or suicidal) could justifiably be penalised. However, since the majority of bands are going to be ringing at a speed in the acceptable middle range, it seems wrong to attempt to rank them according to some self-determined ideal. In addition to the extremes of speed, variability is perhaps something more tangible that can be rated. Even so, who out there has rung a clockwork peal, and is the conventional 2 -minute practice piece and opening rounds of the test piece ever enough really to establish a "good" consistent speed, especially if the latter is being marked"? Full marks to the 12 -bell competitions where the first half or whole course is not marked.

Is is rhythm? Good ringing which we label rhythmic is probably so described more because of an absence of faults than any other quality Uneven leading and drumming for example are often quoted . . . as upsetting the rhythm . . . but have we not already taken them into account by including them in the faults tally? It amounts to penalising a team twice for the same mistake!

So, just what is it? We all smile at the Ice Skating Judge, arms aloft with his two cards, but have we ever considered the context in which the impression mark is actually used there. submit to rate or quantify "technique" as an "interpretation" of the music. How on earth do we "interpret" Cambridge Minor or Grandsire Doubles except by perhaps the originality of the touch in relation to the tone of the bells! I have visions of a judge in the tower studying our facial ecstasy as we sway in unison with the roll-ups
before awarding his marks. No, I rather suspect we have latched onto the concept without looking at it closely enough
In summary, why not use impression scores as a last resort to decide between teams of equal fault scores. Despite all the drawbacks outlined above it has to be said that some team ringing just "sparkles" in comparison to others, despite close overall fault marks

## Saint Wulfram's honours a century of membership



At their Annual Dinner on the last Friday in June. the members of the Saint Wulfram's Society of Change Ringers were reminded that theirs was the oldest society in Grantham and district. The surprising fact that Mr. Fred Pinchbeck did not mention was that for a quarter of the Society's existence both he and Mr. Tom Relf had been members. There was thus much to celebrate: two of its members each with 50 years of service to the Society, and 40 years since the ring of ten bells at Saint Wulfram's Church had been recast, rehung and re-dedicated on Whitsunday, 1947.

After sampling the delights of dinner at the Brownlow Arms at Hough-on-the-Hill, the Secretary, Mr. Brian Buttery, spoke. He first of all welcomed the guests for the evening, the Rev. Robert Reiss and his wife Dixie. He felt that two vital ingredients were sometimes forgotten when the appointment of a new Rector of Grantham was made: was the person a "ringable Rector" and was he tall enough to wear the Rector"s cope? Fortunately in the appointment of Bob Reiss the former was true, and a ringing member had been able to adjust the latter. He thanked the Rector for the help and encouragement that he had given since his arrival at Grantham. The Secretary welcomed the two members with 50 years' service, Fred Pinchbeck and Tom Relf. and promised them more later. He then reminded the members that this year was the 40th anniversary of the re-dedication of the bells of Saint Wulfram's. The Rev. H. Law James, a Master of the Lincoln Guild, had written a letter 10 the Grantham Parish Magazine in 1930. complaining of the state of Grantham's ring of bells. They were out of tune, noisy, not only to residents outside the tower but to the ringers
inside ringing the bells. It took 17 years and a World War before matters could be put right. and now the Society enjoyed one of the best rings of ten bells in the country. Finally, Brian Buttery welcomed the Guild Ringing Master to the dinner, Mr. Denis Frith. The Society had welcomed the Master to its dinners before, but this was the first occasion that they could do so from their own ranks. He said that Mr. Frith might have found a certain irreverence since his appointment in the belfry at Saint Wulfram's, but he was sure that he (Mr. Frith) had detected a quiet pride by the members that Saint Wulfram's Society had the Master within its membership (murmurs of approval and applause).
The Rev. Rober Reiss thanked the members for their invitation and asked them to think back and realise what momentous happenings there had been in the last 50 years, yet through them all Fred Pinchbeck and Tom Relfhad remained members of the Society: a wonderful achievement. He had great pleasure in presenting them with two certificates recognising their 50 years of service to Saint Wulfram's Church and to ringing in Lincolnshire.

The Tower Captain of Saint Wulfram's Society, Mr. Martin Ward, then presented two carriage clocks to Tom and Fred, pointing out that they were in no way a reflection on their time-keeping. as their attendance at Saint Wulfram's belfy was exemplary.
They both expressed their thanks for the presentations, Tom reminding members of all the friendships and happy memories that had been built up over the period of their membership. In typical style. Fred said he had some good news and some bad; the good news was that he was to give a speech, but the bad news was that he did not know when to stop. He spoke of the halcyon days of the Society when young members were recruited from the Kings School and change-ringing flourished at Saint Wulfram's. He felt that these were returning as the School were once again providing the Society with some new recruits, and on this note of optimism he sat down, to much applause. With Fred in this form members felt that he could have gone on much longer.
A celebration cake, dedicated to "The Gold Boys", was served with the coffee, whilst the certificates, prepared by Mr. Vaughan Evans, and the carriage clocks were admired by all the members: an Annual Dinner long to be remembered in the history of the Society ended on a very happy note.

## Progress at Limehouse

Plans are well advanced to hang a new ring of bells at St. Anne's. Limehouse in the heart of London's East End.
A ring of six bells, tenor 8 cwt ., were removed from the redundant church of $S t$. Paul, Homerton in the early summer of 1983 and are in storage at Whitechapel (sce R.W. Sept. 2, 1983). St. Anne's magnificent tower, by Nicholas Hawksmoor. Architect of Christ Church. Spitalfields, has never housed a ring of bells, although it does house three clock bells.
Initial plans were to rehang just the Homerton six for ringing and to restore the clock bells for chiming only. However the restoration committee "Care for St. Anne"s" has agreed to a revised scheme to provide a new bellframe designed to house up to ten bells and to remodel the nine existing bells (six + three) into a ring of eight. This would be achieved by recasting the two quarter bells into one heavier bell and using the existing 18 cwt hour bell as tenor of the new ring.

This work would be carried out as part of Stage 3 of the restoration of St. Anne's which would include stonecleaning and structural repairs to the tower and restoration of the clock. All this was originally estimated to cost $£ 350,000$ but costs have since increased to about £450.000.
However sufficient money has already been raised to enable the stonecleaning and structural work to get under way in the next lew months. The clock will be restored and bells will be installed after this work is complete and once the remaining $£ 120,000$ has been raised.

As part of the Limehouse Festival weekend. Walter Dobbie's JUBI PEAL ( 6 bells, tenor 5 lbs) will be erected in the churchyard on Saturday 15 th August (see advert) and the tower will be open to members of the general public to see conditions before work begins. Walter hopes to bring along his portable handbell foundry and a bellringing exhibition will also be mounted in the proposed new ringing chamber. Several thousand people are expected to visit the festival and visitors will be able to see many other events most of which will be free. The new Docklands Light Railway passes close to the church and provides an ideal opportunity for sightsecing in Docklands. Hells at other East London churches will be avaitable on request.
One further fundraising event will be the Limehouse Marathon, sponsored in aid of the tower appeal, on Saturday 12th September Anyone who would like to participate would be more than welcome even if they only attempt part of the course.

## Obvious alternative

The obvious alternative to celebrating special occasions at churches where there are no bells is to ring a handbell peal! This was again done immediately after the wedding of Father Malcolm Smeaton and Angela Cowgill, at St. Bartholomew's Church, Longbenton, Newcastle upon Tyne. recently. Fr. Malcolm is Curate at the Church and a personal friend of the conductor, but the church. alas, has no bells. After the marriage service, attended by some 300 guests, and the reception in the Church hall. the peal was started, in a side hall, much to the delight of those still at the reception. After several interruptions, the guests gradually dwindled and drifted off and we were left to finish the peal in peace, being entertained afterwards by the Churchwarden, before going on to ring a tower bell peal at Blaydon in the evening!

## A recipe for success

They coped superbly, even though the number present considerably exceeded the number of teas booked in advance. It was at this point that the mystery of the missing President was solved - Wilf Boucher turned up half-way through tea, having spent most of the day repairing a fault which had immobilised his car.

Evening ringing took place at Veryan and at Truro, where it was possible for visitors to sample the delights of the newly-raised ringing floor at Kenwyn. After so warm a day there was only one place in which to relax. The Vicar's generous decision to donate half the church collection to the Guild's Bell Restoration Fund was an added bonus.

## Board for peal rung 36 years ago

Sunday, 12th July, 1987, was a special day for the ringers and congregation of St. Mary's, Slough, because it marked the retirement carlier this year of Bill Birmingham as Tower Captain after 42 years' service.

The day started at $8.40 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. with a quarter peal of Yorkshire Surprise Royal for Sung Eucharist. This was followed by a special Choral Evensong, during which a peal board. given by the ringers and congregation, was dedicated and presented to Bill as a token of appreciation.

The service, conducted by the Rev. Alan Hignell, was preceded by open ringing. About 50 ringers from surrounding districts took part, ably looked-after by Pat Newton, local Branch Ringing Master of the Oxford Diocesan Guild. Whilst ringing was in progress, some members of St. Mary's congregation look advantage of an open invitation to visit the ringing chamber to meet the ringers and see them in action.

The peal hoard presented to Bill is somewhat unique, since it describes a peal rung 36 years ago! Superbly written, it records the first successful peal attempt on the then newlyaugmented ring of ten bells in 1951. The first attempt, a year previously, had apparently failed after three hours' ringing, when one of the band. Frank V. Sinkins, found that at 85 years of age his legs wouldn't support him any more! # A False Peal at St. Peter's Church, St. Albans <br> by H. V.FROST 

Church Bells 21st August 1880, p. 611 .

## Notice

The Royal Cumberland Society's Annual Feast, will take place on Saturday, the 28th inst., at the "Red Lion". St. Albans. Invitation hereby given to members and friends of outlying districts who will favour the Society with their company. The Rev.H. N. Dudding, the Vicar, has kindly allowed the use of St. Peter's twelve bells, and steps are being taken to obtain the use of the ring of eight at the Abbey. Dinner Stewards - Mr Alfred Kirk and Mr George Flavell. [No account of this meeting has yet been discovered.]

The twelve bells had been opened in 1868 by a joint company of College Youths, Cumberlands, Benington and local ringers. ("Mr. Haley has been chipping a little more out of our 4th of the ten. as it had become slightly sharp again.") The profesional twelve ringers engaged included 11. Haley, J. Cox, Muskett, Miller, Dwight, Rogers, Pettit and Banks. In 1881, the eleventh became cracked through an accident to the clapper, the tenth was later found to be cracked so were recast in 1883, the two trebles handed over in part payment for the recasting.
J. W. Snowdon's list of twelve-bell towers published in 1876 states: "No peal ever rung"
F. E. Dawe, W. E. L. Buckingham, G. W. Debenham and other old ringers were quite sure that a peal had been attempted on the twelve, only Mr. Cox had been listening and the band were informed "No Peal Ioday, gentlemen!" Mr. A. A. Hughes (Whitechapel) thought that it was a peal of Stedman Caters that was false and he gave a chuckle!

Haley, and has the 2. 3, 4, 5, 6 regular behind the ninth, each part being called alike. except the first and last courses. The above peal is an original composition by Mr. H. Haley sen., and was rung and conducted by him for the first time. May 16. 1842, at the above church.

The Fulham Peal

Under this heading was a long letter signed by John Cox who claimed it was his composition and was composed by him in early 1835 and he attempted to call it at St. Magnus the Martyr on the 13 th August 1836 and after ringing nearly three hours, lost it through illness on his part On the 20th December in the same year, 5001 Stedman's Caters were rung at St. Saviour's, coming round for policy at 11 sixes from a

course end instead of 18, as he could not go for his 5079 through the incompetency of one of the ringers, the former coming round being mucheasier

He mentioned the names of Mr George Marriott, Charles Goozee and Mr Robert Jameson who all had seen the figures or knew of them.

He ended his letter by writing "It may not be amiss to mention that since the time of Messrs. Noonan and Gross up to 1845, the longest length of Stedman's Caters with the treble in 2nds place, viz., 59 courses, was rung at St. Clement's. May 16 th 1845 composed and conducted by myself; the caller of the 5079 hearing it, in a few weeks added another course having 2 singles, which caused them to be out of course This 60 was rung at Poplar, March 17th 1846, but the first time a 60 courses was rung was at St James's. Bermondsey, 25th Sep. 1845, and not in 1846 as stated in Mr Hubbard's Book of 1854 This peal, an original with bobs only by me, treble in 2 nds place, 2 sixes only excepted"

## Church Bells 15th June 1878 p. 326

The Fulham Peal - Answer to Mr Cox Mr Haley wrote that he had never heard of or knew anyone that remembers Mr Cox attempting to call the peal in question, nor was it rung till he called it at Fulham in 1842. If Mr Cox had attempted to call the peal in 1836, it appears very strange that he did not claim it when I called it in 1842, and why he did not send the peal to Mr Hubbard who, he felt sure would have put his name to it in the book he published in 1854 which was iwelve years after the tirst time I had called it; therefore, as he did not, and the peal is in that book with my name in it. p.124, I claim it to be my original peal. But Mr. Cox may have made a mistake in the peal; does he mean the 5079 which he called at Si. Albans'?

With regard to the 60 courses Mr. Cox is in error. He called 59 courses at St. Clement's in May 1845, which he states, and for which there is a tablet in the steeple. In three weeks after. I oblained another course, making 60, with the treble in 2nd's place at each course end. \&c..
with bobs only. This peal is in Hubbard's book, 1854, p.179, which I can truthfully say is the first 60 courses ever composed true with the treble in 2 nd 's place and the 7th, 8th and 9 th in the tittum position. This peal has never been rung or attempted.

In the same issue was a letter from G. Muskett which explained that following an attempt by the Cumberlands to ring a long length of Grandsire Caters at Fulham on Easter Monday, a great many of the College Youths went down to hear this said long peal, but the ringers had got out, lowered the bells and gone home - or gone to Putney. Not knowing how to occupy their time for the rest of the day, they asked permission to go for a peal of Stedman's Caters, which was rung. The Cumberlands had taxed them with bribing the steeplekeeper to allow them to go up the tower and now Mr. John Cox actually claims the peal as his composition. He quotes the names of Messrs. Marriott and Jameson to verify his statement. Both these gentlemen at that time, I am certain, knew nothing whatever about the composition of Stedman and I doubt if they know a very great deal now. As for the late Mr. Charles Goozee, he was a man far advanced in the science and highly respected by all who knew him; but then the man is dead. What is the use of bringing his name in question?

## Church Bells 22nd June 1878 p. 339

## The Fulham Peal

Mr Henry Dains was one of the Cumberlands who had not gone to Putney on Easter Monday and could throw some light upon this subject of Caters generally.

In the first attempt at this long peal, ten of our Royal company rang a touch that lasted about seven hours and a half; and on the abovementioned day they rang about three hours. It will thus be see that these touches together equal about three such peals as the one rung with so much boast on Easter Monday by the College Youths. During this performance one other, at least, of the Cumberlands was in his place, who amused himself in some quiet spot by noting down the course ends and composition of this peal as it progressed, and thus it was found to be the very one Mr Cox claims to have composed about the year 1836; at which time I may say, he was a College Youth, and Mr Halcy a Cumberland Youth, and therefore each man has now his friends, \&ec., irrespective of the Society to which he at present belongs.

Mr Cox was in but one or two of the peals rung during the years 1839 to 1844, being on a provincial tour through the north of England for the benefit of his health.

## Church Bells 6th July 1878 p. 363

Mr Haley replied that all Mr Dains wrote is from hearsay and not proof as he was scarcely (if at all) in the world when the 5079 was rung at Fulham in 1842. He also states that Mr Cox was a College Youth and myself a Cumberland in 1836. This is a fiction. I was made a Cumberland August 4 1840, he also states that Mr Cox went for a provincial tour through the north of England for the benefit of his health from 1839 to 1844. Now, Sir, this is another fiction. Mr Cox went to the North with three others besides himself, all of whom I knew well, but it was on a tour with the handbells. They returned and were in London in 1842 and one of them (Mr John Freeman) heard the peal at Fulham, after which he walked with myself and others to the City.

Mr Dains also states that one at least of the Cumberlands amused himself by noting down the course ends at Fulham on Easter Monday. I flatter myself that he did not cause so much alarm to the caller, or the ringers, as the one did that noted down the course ends at St. Albans.
[The Fulham peal has now run its full extent and it is time for the conductor to crv "Stand!" - Ed.]

## Church Bells 20th July 1878 p. 387

'Peeping Tom' wrote, I am forbidden to open again either of the later controversies which have taken place regarding peals recently rung at All Saints' Church [Fulham] amd I do not wish to do so. The most careful and trustworthy persons are apt to make mistakes and sometimes are liable to become the victims of delusion. But it was no mistake at St. Albans, when on one occasion the Royal Cumberlands (late London Scholars) attempled a peal there, and which peal would have been grandiloquently recorded had not someone outside the steeple pointed out that a false peal had been rung.

## Belfry Records

Church Bells 3 rd August 1878 p. 411
St. Nicholas, Newcastle-on-Tyne
On March 27th 1842 (Easter Sunday) the Union Society of Newcastle and Gateshead changeringers in company with J. Cox and J. Freeman, two members of the Society of St. James" Youths. London rang on the bells of this Tower, a true and complete peal of Grandsire Triples, consisting of 5040 changes in the unprecedented time of 2 hours and 59 minutes. Weight of tenor, 36 cwt . etc. J. Freeman rang the fourth and John Cox conducted from the fifth.

## ChurchBells 17th August 1878 p. 435

## All Saints, Newcastle

On Thursday March 12th 1842 the Union Society of Newcastle and Gateshead changeringers, having been visited by 4 members of the Society of St. James' Youths, London, rang in this Steeple Holt's peal of Grandsire Triples, 5040 changes in 3 hours. Weight of tenor. 19 cwt . John Cox conducted from the third and John Freeman rang the fourth.

Mr. J. A. Trollope in his books Stedman and The College Youths gives the date of Haley's 7025 Stedman Caters at Poplar as 1844 , but the Peal Book of the Cumberland Youths and the Peal Board as well as Haley's Peal Book give the date as 1846, the year after Cox's 6701 was rung at Bermondsey ( 60 courses without singles). To quote Mr. Trollope: "A newspaper controversy arose in The Era over the rival merits of the two compositions." J. Cox's 59 courses rung at St. Clement Danes and Haley's 60 courses with bobs only but never attempted or rung are published in Hubbard's book, 1854 edition as are also the compositions of the two "first" handbell peals of Stedman Triples, now disputed. (Haley's and Brook's Variations.)

## Bell News 16th June 1894 p. 47

## Stedman Triples in Hand

Under the heading of 'Central Council Correspondence' a letter from Henry Dains, representing the Society of Royal Cumberland Youths drew attention to a statement in 'The Bell News' of 1888 to the effect that the first peal of Stedman Triples rung in hand was a false performance.


A copy of the record of this performance taken from the peal book of the Society was given:
Change-Ringing Extraordinary - On Monday, December the 19th, 1853. Four Members of the London Cumberland Socicty of Change-Ringers met at The Three Kings, Clerkenwell, London and succeeded in ringing on handbells in hand, A True Peal of Stedman Triples, consisting of 5040 changes which was brought round in excellent style in 2 hours and 40 minutes. Performers: Mr John Cox I-2; Mr Thomas Powell, 3-4; Mr Hy. Wm. Haley, 5-6; Mr Thomas Britten, 7-8. Conducted by Mr John Cox.
"The above was the first peal of Stedman Triples ever rung in hand, and was performed in the presence of nineteen members of the College Youths and Cumberland Societies, including Messrs J. Miller, C. Andrews, E. Stokes, J. Fairbairn, H. Burwash, etc. Several of them had the figures of the peal hefore them and ticked off the sixes as they were rung. "

## Bells News 23 rd June 1894 p. 64

Mr William Cooter sent a copy of the letters which had appeared in "Bell News" in 1888 from himself, Thomas Powell (the ringer of 3-4) and George Dorrington. He commented that his condemnation of the peal had been made publicly from 1853 till now. When "Bell's Life" and "Church Bells" refused to insert his letters, he had no opportunity of vindicating his position in print till 1888 when "Bell News" gave him hischance.
"The ringer of 3-4 was too intent upon his own share and was hardly qualified at that time to judge whether his associates were right or wrong.

The last two lines, copied by Mr Dains, that several of them had the figures of the peal hefore them and ticked off the sixes as they were rung: are a - well pure invention, as Mr M. A. Wood can testify."
"During the latter part of 1853 , the rivalry was very keen between the two London senior societies respecting the first peal of Stedman Triples upon handbells. After several attempts by both parties, the Cumberlands rang on December 19th $1853,2 \mathrm{hrs} .40 \mathrm{mins}$. At the termination 1 publicly stated in the room (Mr
(Continued overleaf)
M. A. Wood was with me) that Cox shiffed his bells for nearly a course, and put them right just before the part-end came up; consequently many changes were struck twice and others not at all. I was pooh-poohed, and the touch was paraded as a true peal. Some years afterwards, the late Mr. Haley acknowledged in the presence of Messrs M. A. Wood, Dorrington, myself and many others, that Mr Cox sequestered $1-2$, and that I was correct in condemning what I saw; he also added that the first true peal was rung on January 20th 1854, every blow of which he heard and which was called, Sir, by your obedient servant, William Cooter."
Mr George Dorrington wrote that he and at least a dozen others heard the late Mr Haley make the confession that the peal was false. He added that when our late friend John Cox heard what Mr Haley had said, he (John Cox) did not attempt to deny it, but only remarked "Did he though, ah?"
Week by week the correspondence continued and letters from M. A. Wood, W. Baron, J. Neims. G. Williams and 'A London Ringer', both for and against the assertion. Other so-called peals were questioned, such as a peal of Treble Bob with the same bell in the slow for two leads running and the 'Time Peal' at Bethnal Green in 1844 when a band started for Grandsire Triples, when the only watch in the tower stopped; atter ringing four hours the party came down. Result, no peal. Conductor John cox.
"In 1865 the Cumberland Society celebrated their anniversary at St. Albans, Herts; in the morning ten members rang about 3 thours: after

mutual congratulations and dinner, Mr Haley dazed the company by stating that one bell was before four times instead of three; the member who rang the said bell is now alive. Result, no peal. Conductor, John Cox. I mention these circumstances to show how unreliable Cox was, and that if he would ring false peals at one time, he would at another. Advice to correspondents, 'mind your dates'.

## Bell News 4th August 1894 p. 126.

Editorial: (Harvey Reeves)
Those who know Mr. Cooter intimately, who have had years of intercourse with him, who are acquainted with the high chracter he bears for rectitude and truth in peal-ringing, believe in his honesty and integrity in this particular instance. It is a painful duty to have to say that the very eminent and distinguished ringer whose name is brought before us so prominently in connection with this peal, did not enjoy such a name for reliability in pealringing as his great talents entitled him to. We have only to read the instances mentioned in this week's correspondence. Not because he was not able - no man more so: but if an accident occurred while ringing, the temptation to "make a peal" was sometimes too great to be withstood.

The St. Albans episode is a case in point. And who doubts that those 'revolutions of the bells' -as this performance was eventually designated in print - would not have been dignified by the name of "peal" had not Mr. Haley suddenly appeared in the churchyard and detected the omission of a bob at 5 ; an omission fatal to the truth of the performance.

The present generation would have heard nothing of the St. Albans fiasco or the time-peal of Bethnal Green had not the correspondence been continued. Better to destroy the record of the peal and have done with it altogether, than have the mistakes and errors of such a man as John Cox exposed to view."

## The Era Sunday 6th August 1865

"Change Ringing - On Monday, July 31st, the London Cumberland Society of Change Ringers celebrated their 120 th anniversary at St . Albans, Herts. They arrived in the town shortly after eight oclock. and were received by the clergy and churchwardens, John Lewis, Esq.. Richard Tulfitt, Esq., and many of the leading inhabitants of the town. L. Proctor, Esq., of Bennington and Jeremiah Miller, Esq.. accompanied the party. Mr. Miller as Master of the Society, wearing his insignia of office. The abbey was visited, where Mr. G. Morris, steeple-keeper of St. Martin-in-the-Fields and "champion chimer", played a variety of sacred
airs on the bells. [The Abbey bells were unringable 1832-1871.] During the day ten of the picked members of the company ascended the tower of St. Peter's, and rang, in their usual brilliant style, 5079 revolutions of the much admired method of caters on Stedman's Principle, which occupied 3 hours 26 mins . The performers were John Cox, treble; John Nelms, 2d; Isasac Rogers, 3d; Thomas Druton, 4th; Henry Swaine, 5th; John Home, 6th; George Marriott, 7th; George Turl, 8th; John Rogers, 9 th; William Howard, tenor. The peal was composed by Mr John Cox and was conducted in his usual able manner. Professor Haley, Messrs Wood, Middleton, \&c., expressed themselves highly satisfied with the result. During the afternoon the company rang several touches on the hand-bells." [per Cyril Wratten]

## Bell's Life in London Sunday 26th August 1865

Change-Ringing - On Monday, Aug. 21, ten members of the Ancient Society of College Youths rang in excellent style on the bells of St . Peter's Church, St. Albans, a true and complete peal of Stedman cators, consisting of 5079 changes, in 3 h 26 min , being the first peal on the bells for eight years. Performers: H. W. Haley treble. R. Jameson 2, G. E. Ferris 3, T. Powell 4, J. Pettit 5, E. G. Langton 6, R. Hopkins 7, W. C. Middleton of Gravesend 8, M. A. Wood 9, J. Dwight tenor. The above was composed and conducted by H. W. Haley. [Per Cyril Wratten]

## 45－SPLICED SURPRISE MAJOR（all the work）

by Adrian Malton

I was spurred on to writing this article after the publication of the Kent band＇s achievement of 165－spliced（RW p873）．Congratulations to them．

All the work Spliced Surprise Major is a totally different ball game from that of short－course tenors－together spliced． The conventional music is virtually non－existent and what there is comes when you least expect it．Some ringers do not like the tenors parted at any cost．However，bands who have rung Norman Smith＇s or Tim Pett＇s 23－spliced all the work may like to try some of the other methods included in the 45－spliced in peals of a reasonably standard length．
The basic composition，by A．R．Peake，is as follows：

Method names are abbreviated to their first one or two letters as appropriate，except where shown below．Bobs are indicated by full stops．

Contains 224 of Aldershot，Ashtead，Barnwood，Belfast， Bisley，Bristol，Cambridge（Cm），Cassiobury（Cs），Caversham （Cv），Cholsey，Conisbrough，Cray，Double Dublin，Ealing， Fairford，Fordingbridge，Glasgow，Goring，Harwell，Hereford， Ickleton，Ipswich，Jersey，Kenninghall，Lincolnshire（Lc）， Lindum（Ld），Maulden，Portishead，Privett，Pudsey，Ringwood， Romsey，Rutland，Scawthorpe，Sonning，Stockport，Tavistock， Uxbridge，Wantage（Wn），Watford（Wt），Wembley，Whalley， wordsworth and Yorkshire，with 314 changes of method and all the work of each method for every bell．
When I planned the series of attempts culminating in the 45 ， the band had to be au fait with the methods in Norman Smith s 23－spliced so that there was absolutely no hesitation when ringing whalley or Tavistock．Then the possibly awkward trio of Barnwood，Bisley and Fairford adds a challenge，and I suggest that the following peal of 25 methods（ 5600 changes） is rung for starters：

Note that Kenninghall is rung in the third lead instead of Cornwall in the 23．Harwell should present fewer problems at the back as the places in 5－6 are right，but the 3 rd＇s and 4 th＇s place bells need to be careful．

If the composition of $45-\mathrm{spl}$ iced is examined it can be seen that if Whalley is not bobbed you restart again at Rutland． This gives scope for inserting two courses of new methods． Thus the following peal of 25 methods（ 5600 changes）is available：

The new methods come after the bob at the end of Harwell． Sonning needs to be mastered thoroughly，especially 4 th＇s and 7 th＇s place bells，as does Romsey，which is actually Sonning above the treble．Ealing and Ickleton are straightforward and Stockport has a lot of Rutland in it．In Fordingbridge there is a temptation to put in unnecessary dodges in 3－4 but the methods are all the same lead end group，so that helps．

The methods at the end of the 45 -spliced can also be introduced in an arrangement of 23 methods ( 5152 changes):

In these new methods it is important that Belfast is well known so that 5 th's and 6 th's place bells do not foul up the middle of the lead. Goring and Hereford are fairly straightforward. Scawthorpe is a pleasant combination of Watford and Lindum with a 5 -pull dodge across the half-lead and, of course, 3 rd 's and 6 th 's place Scawthorpe and Aldershot are Watford. Wantage is tedious in the extreme, especially as in one part 2 and 8 are on the front for 11 dodges together; 5 th's, 7 th's and 8 th's place bells are Barnwood. Wordsworth can be tricky if the hunting all the way is not completed: 2 nd's and 4 th's place bells are Wembley. In the last part be prepared for the 87 s in this method when the tenor is 6th's place bell. Cholsey is also reasonably straightforward but needs to be learnt thoroughly as it is bobbed to run into the Pudsey.

Thus there are three different peals available in which all methods of the 45 can be rung by way of practice.

Having become confident on the lines, bands may wish to go straight to the 45 which is 10080 changes or try an intermediate length. Concentration does suffer the further the peal goes, but we had some excellent ringing in the fifth and very musical sixth parts. There are various permutations but $I$ suggest one of the following peals if the extra length should want to be practised:

## In Western Canada - May 1987

In August 1986 Michael Simpson of Victoria, British Columbia, wrote to The Ringing World giving brief details of a proposed tour to Western Canada as part of the fund raising effort towards the completion of Christ Church Cathedral. The tour took place in May. The party of 19 was led by Canon Free of Bristol Cathedral and included seven ringers.

We were met at Calgary Airport by Molly Whan Tong from Victoria and Andrew Bushell of the Calgary band. Molly was responsible for all the travel arrangements and was to accompany us to Vancouver on the first part of the tour. Ringing at Calgary had been arranged for Sunday morning but as it would be limited to the time between services Andrew had arranged for us to ring on Saturday evening. We were feeling the effects of the flight and it was about 1 a.m. UK time but Molly's welcoming drinks helped to revive us before we lef for Elbow Park. With Andrew and Ann Williams of the local band we enjoyed an hour's ringing including touches of Grandsire Triples, Bob Major and Cambridge Minor. Calgary is one of the most isolated change ringing towers with the nearest towers in Vancouver and Mission City over 500 miles away so we were pleased to hear that the local band had scored a quarter peal of Bob Minor earlier in the day. On Sunday morning we joined the local band to ring for the $11 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Eucharist. The ringing was recorded and we hope that the BBC will be able to use part of the service touch of Bob Major in the Bells on Sunday programme. Our coach was ready to leave immediately after the service so our stay in Calgary was all too brief and we were sorry to leave so soon after such an enthusiastic welcome from the local ringers.

Our journey from Calgary to Vancouver was by coach and train through the spectacular Rocky Mountain scenery of the Banff and Jasper National Parks. There were overnight stops at Banff and Lake Louise. Before leaving Banff on Monday morning we took the lift to the top of Sulphur Mountain for fine views of Banff, the Bow Valley and the surrounding peaks. Lake Louise is 5280 feet above sea level and we woke on Tuesday morning to find that several inches of snow had fallen during the night. The drive from Lake Louise to Jasper followed the 140 mile Icefields Parkway. This road winds round the mountains and climbs passes over 6000 feet about sea level. Wild life is strongly protected in the National Parks, mountain sheep and deer wandered near the road and elk, caribou and a coyote were seen during the day. At Jasper we relaxed over tea at the Jasper Park Lodge, famous for its cycling waiters delivering orders to the lodges in the grounds.

After dinner in Jasper we boarded the train for the 16 hour journey to Vancouver. During the night the train crosses into British Columbia and in the early morning works its way along the side of the Fraser Canyon. Later in the morning we could see across the Fraser River to Westminster Abbey, Mission City, where we were to ring later in the week.

Thursday morning was taken up with a con-

ducted sightseeing tour of Vancouver. In the evening we met the local ringers for a practice at Holy Rosary Cathedral - the ringers having kindly postponed their practice from Tuesday so that we could join them. We were pleased to meet Michacl Simpson who had managed to come over from Victoria. A successful practice included Grandsire, Stadman and Oxford Bob Triples, Double Norwich and Cambridge Major. Afterwards we adjourned to the "local" which turned out to be the cafe that Frank Hicks had discovered as the best place for breakfast! We were grateful to Jeff White and Ted Lee for driving us on Friday afternoon to Mission City about 40 miles east of Vancouver. We were welcomed at the Abbey by Fr. Benedict who showed us round the Church and demonstrated the remarkable acoustics. In the tower we met Brother John who stayed to ring some Grandsire Triples with us. Michael Simpson had also come along so the ringing included Grandsire Caters as well as Stedman Triples and Double Norwich. It was a warm sunny afternoon and after ringing we were glad to stroll in the grounds to the view point overlooking the Fraser River.
Back in Vancouver that evening we met Archdeacon Ted Greenhalgh and his wife Isabel from Christ Church Cathedral who had travelled over to accompany us on the trip to Victoria the following day. We arrived in Victoria at 3.30 p.m. on Saturday the 23 rd May after a journey which included a pleasant $1 \frac{1}{2}$ hour ferry crossing. The ladies of the Christ Church Parish Guild had prepared a splendid tea for us and we were welcomed by the Dean, the Rt. Rev. John Frame. Molly introduced us to our hosts and we were soon driven home by the various families who were to look after us during the week.

On Sunday morning we joined in ringing for both the services enjoying touches of Grandsire Caters, Stedman Caters and Bob Royal. In the afternoon the visiting ringers and their hosts were invited to a barbecue by Arthur and Cynthia Izard at their home overlooking the Saanich Inlet. During the afternoon we were entertained by some handbell ringing and also heard the tape of the ringing at Calgary.

Monday was devoted to sightseeing. In the morning we toured the Provincial Museum of British Columbia and some of the more energetic managed to visit the Parliament Buildings as well. In the evening the group met for dinner together before visiting the attractive Butchart Gardens about 13 miles north of Victoria. There
was more sightseeing on Tuesday with a city tour which included a panoramic view of Greater Victoria from nearby Mt. Tolmie and ended with a visit to Sealand with its seals, sea lions and killer whales. Before attending the ringing practice in the evening we were entertained to another delicious meal by David and Mary Barlow. Another busy day ended with more ringing chat over drinks at "The Old Bailey". The Dean and Mrs. Frame with some parishioners joined us for a full day excursion on Wednesday. We were entertained to lunch by the parish of Nanoose Bay on the west coast of Vancouver Island over 70 miles north of Victoria. Stops on the way included the forestry museum at Duncan with a steam train ride and Chemainus where the history of the area is illustrated in a series of outdoor mural paintings. After lunch the tour continued into the MacMillan Provincial Park for a walk among the giant Douglas firs at Cathedral Grove. Back in Victoria that evening we were guests for dinner with various Cathedral families.

On Thursday we were free to amuse ourselves until the evening when we attended the Ascension Day Eucharist followed by a Parish Supper. During the aftemoon the Dean showed a group round the Cathedral describing its history and explaining the completion plans. Before the service a band made up of Michael and Judith Simpson, Michael Batten and all the visitors attempted a quarter peal of Grandsire Caters. We were all disappointed when this came to grief after about 20 minutes' good ringing. After the supper Canon Free thanked Molly for her work in organising the visit and presented her with a giant pot plant on behalf of the visitors. In her reply Molly announced that the estimated profit made towards the completion fund was £1800.
Friday was free for last minute sightseeing and shopping until we met at Victoria Airport for the short llight to Vancouver. Archdeacon Greenhalgh, Molly and some of the host families were there to see us off. At Vancouver we changed planes for the night flight to London. This was the end of a memorable and successful tour and our grateful thanks are due to everyone who made it so memorable - the ringers at Calgary, Vancouver and Victoria for all the ringing arrangements, our hosts in Victoria for their generous hospitality and of course Molly for the overall organisation.

## Home from home in Aberdeen

Ringing in Aberdeen on the first new ring in Scotland for very many years has come substantially closer with the steady progress that can now be reported. The earlier front page article (R.W.. March 20th, 1987) had announced the exciting and important news of the ring of eight to be hung in St. Machar's Cathedral, Old Aberdeen. Now we record that the essential preliminary work prior to installing the bells has been successfully completed.

Construction work in the tower began several weeks ago with the formation of the working platform just below the projected level of the grillage to support the bell-frame. The platform stands on a convenient level of massive granite corbels, originally used some 4-500 years ago for the floors built in the tower when it was inhabited by the early Bishops of Aberdeen. Will St. Machar's have the only ringing chamber with an open fireplace and chimney?

Other unusual features in the construction of the tower, however, have posed some tricky problems, for the work involved in getting the grillage, frame, bells and fittings actually into

## An appropriate choice

## First on bells by local band

R. H. Hall requests information on the occasions first peal on the bells have been achieved by a local band (R.W., 24 July, p. 660).

One such instance was at North llinksey, Oxford. when on 20th April 1981 the local ringers scored the first on the bells to five Minor methods. this being the first attempt by all except the conductor

The quarter peal at Liverpool (Walton-on. the-Hill) on 30 May (p. 694) was rung as a Silver W'edding compliment to Mr. and Mrs. Cowic.
the tower and so on up into position. The base of the tower consists of a solid, vaulted, stoneroofed vestry, which denies the usual route of vertical access for the bells. The tower walls are some $4 t$ feet or more thick but, by chance, an old bricked-up window, more than 15 feet above ground level, when opened-up gave relatively direct entry to the ringing chamber to be. The massive walls resulted in very arduous and laborious excavations for the formation of the holes for the grillage - not the slightest concern now exists for the strength of the tower for ringing!

The installation work is being undertaken by the local ringers, led by Martin Whiteley, working under the supervision of former bellhanger John Jenkins of Edinburgh, brought back to active service just for this one special project. Because of the special problems of access to the tower and the need to protect the fabric of the Cathedral's remarkable medizeval west front, exhaustive studies and calculations were undertaken by the "engineers" of heights, angles and safe working loads for several athernative methods. In the event, the weather created more difficult working conditions than the potential mechanical complexities. In the incessant downpours, thick fog and high winds, the churchyard took on the semblance of a North Sea oil platform as steel girders and other heavy metal objects were hauled aloft by a crew of men whose appearance had more than a little to do with the offishore oil industry! In two weekends' work the entire grillage was raised into position, made true and bolted tight prior to being cemented finally in situ into the tower walls, and all the side frames were stacked ready for later installation. Such was the carlier careful preparation that the grillage was found to be perfectly horizontal in all dimensions from the placement of the first beam to the tightening of the last nut and bolt.

The bells and frame from St. Stephen's. Ealing, could have been tailor-made for St. Machar's Cathedral, so little major difliculty is anticipated when the assembly of the frame and bell-hanging begins in the middle of August. Hopes are high that bells will be sounding-out within two months of that time - well within the 12 months from the original inception of the idea of the restoration of bells to the Cathedral, nearly 420 years after they were removed at the Reformation.
