## The Quarter Bells of Lincoln Cathedral

In 1880 the Dean and Chapter decided to replace the clock installed in 1775. At the same time, apparently as the result of pressure from the cathedral organist. Mr. John Young, it was agreed to augment the two quarter bells. These had been cast by Thomas Mears of Whitechapel, London, in 1834 at the same time as he had recast the hour bell known as "Great Tom". The intention was that each quarter hour the fashionable "Cambridge Quarters" should be heard sounding from the central tower of the Cathedral. These chimes were first installed at St. Mary's church, Cambridge, in 1793 and the bells sound as follows:

First Quarter: $\quad 1234$
Second Quarter: $3124 ; 3213$
Third Quarter: $1324: 4213: 1$ 234
Fourth Quarter: $3124 ; 3213 ; 13$ $24 ; 4213^{\prime}$
It was not until the chimes were installed in 1860 ) in order to sound the quarters in St. Stephen's Tower in the Houses of Parliament that it became fashionable to copy them in other places.

## Kilifi, six months on

Yes, the Kilifi Band which undertook an intensive bellringing course last September is going strong. While visiting a friend in Kilifi recently I had the pleasure of attending the hand's weekly practice-night, and was welcomed by David Shaha (Tower Captain/Ringing Master/Steeple Keeper) and his cheerful band. We rang rounds, call-changes, and a plain hunt on five; David said that this could have been a hunt on six, if all his band had been present that evening. I was specially glad to see that the band is recruiting and training new ringers, and that the elements of rope-handling are being well taught. When an overenthusiastic learner displaced a slider by pulling $t(0)$ hard. David rang down the bell in 2 or 3 pulls, nipped up two ladders, restored the slider and was down again in the ringing gallery within a couple of minutes. The band is fortunate in having a supportive vicar, who was present during the practice I attended. Afterwards I was taken up to look at the bells, hung on ball bearings on their sturdy wooden frame regularly inspected and ireated for insect damage

Practice night is Wednesday, 5 p.m. There is service ringing on Sunday momings, and sometimes an additional, practice (but not for the beginners) on Sunday evenings. Kilifi is not at the back of beyond only about an hour by taxi from Mombasa airport; and judging by its Visitors" Book. Kiliti is already on the towergrabbers' list. World-travelling bellringers, put Kilifi in your itincrary: you are sure of a great welcome

Details of the two existing Quarter Bells were as follows:


Each bell was inscribed: thomas mears of L.ONDON FOUNDER 1835. Unfortunately no record appears to exist of their notes.

The Revd. Canon Hutton of Vicars Court Lincoln. appears to have contacted, on behalf of the Dean and Chapter, J. J. Raven the author of Bells in England and W. Potts \& Sons, clockmakers of Leeds. ${ }^{2}$ The former on 15th March sent details of the "Cambridge Quarters" and their history and on 22nd March 1880 Potis wrote as follows:
on a peal of Eight the Quanters are struck on 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 7th bells ... when there are only two quanter Bells as at your Cathedral the notes of the existing Bells have to be amended (we have ordered the Bell Founders to take particulars of these) where the Iwo new bells are made to suit.?
The Chapter Acts for 3 rd April 1880 record that:

Nathaniel Clayton and Mrs Seely, the wife of the M.P. for Lincoln. [had] each offered the gifi of a bell for the improvement of the chiming of the quarters."
On 18th August the Bellfounders (John W. Taylor \& Co. of Loughborough) sent details of the two new bells adding. 'We are very pleased to hear the bells are safely in the tower.' However, Mr. Young was not happy with the "splice" and on 20 th October 1880 Potts wrote:

We are sorry the opening of the clock will be delayed in consequence of the bells not being correct but the large $q \mathrm{r}$ bell has been found to be imperfect the decision you have arrived at to have it recast and made [correct] will be the most satisfactory to you. It would have been better if Taylor had drawn your attention to the Bell being wrong at the first when he came to examine them.

Taylors had written on 18th October 1880 acknowledging an order to recast the largest of the existing quarter bells but after further deliberation the Dean and Chapter decided to have both existing bells recast, the Dean commenting on 20th Octoher 1880: ‘. . . do you not think that the new team will imperiously demand a new Tom and the new Tom a new bell tower?' In a letter dated 21st October 1880 Taylors sent an estimate for recasting the two old bells but pointed out that they had tuned the two new bells to the existing " $A$ " bell. The bells were duly cast but in a letter dated 9th December 1880 Taylors regretted 'the mistake in the word ORATE the E can easily be cut off and TE engraved'. This refers to the inscription on the largest bell!

On 2nd November 1880 Sir Edmund Beckett commented that Taylor knew of the flatness of the bells and that it was unnecessarily stupid of him to leave it so and, of course, he is liable for the expense caused thereby'. In a letter dated 16 th November 1880 Potts commented that Sir Edmund considered the Lincoln clock would surpass Westminster and Worcester but Mr. Young was not at all happy with the new bells, and on 18th December to Canon Hutton:

In answer to your questions about the Chimes I am sorry to say that the Beils are not in tune with one another neither are they in tune with "Great Tom" nor is the tone at all satisfactory to my ear, the dominant note of each Bell not being powerful enough while the harmonics are too much so. This to a cultured ear is very disagreeable indeed sometimes 1 have great difticulty in hearing the real note.
Young went on to say that he did not agree with Sir Edmund regarding the qualities of "Big Ben" and considered that the "Chimes at Westminster Palace are not in tune ...?

Next there followed an interesting letter from the Dean dated 19th December 1880 and addressed to Canon Hutton:

## LINCOLN BELLS - continued

I have had too much experience of the critic not to take his criticisms with several grains of salt; and I greatly applaud your cross-examination. But last night I had unavoidable experience myself of the varied tones, having not got to sleep till near 4 am, and I am inclined to think that both the set \& the velocity of the wind has some effect in altering the pitch of the notes (ie subjectively to the hearer). You will 1 daresay, often have remarked when an engine passes you whistling, that the note sharpens as it approaches you \& flattens as it retreats from you. As the vibrations of the air must be affected unsympatherically by wind when the space within which much of the vibration takes place is broken by masses of stone, I am inclined to suspect that to the ear in any given place slight different sounds are given from what would be given if the atmosphere were perfectly still \& the space unbroken: so that sometimes a bell may sound a little ton sharp \& sometimes a little too flat. At times since the chimes began. I have fancied both of these errors: and although my hearing is of course hard, I do not think it is indiscriminating of harmony.
On 20th December 1880 Taylors wrote:
Mr Young is expecting something that bells do not produce ... When they were struck off everything appeared to give the greatest satisfaction We cannot in the least understand Mr Young's reference to the bells ... What Mr Young required we cannot possibly divine.
The following extracts from Potts' letter, which is also dated 20th December 1880, appear to result from a comment by Canon Hutton on the distance at which Great Tom and the Quarter bells could be heard:
ding dongers are always heard a greater distance than any others ding dong will catch the ear more distinct than musical qrs with 5 hammers but you can have the hammers made heavier, any weight you dare risk the bells but, of course, we must not be answerable for any cracked or broken bells.
On 21 st December 1880 Potts reported that heavier hammers were to be fitted.

Taylors wrote again on 23rd December 1880:
the Cathedral bells [arc] causing us intense anxiety and disappointment ... Never have we sent out bells more satisfactory to our selves ... And even now they have stated nothing definitely, all that we can gather is that the whole lot is out of tune and of bad tone.
In a letter dated 1 st January 1881 Potts commented that he had:
had trouble several times ... with him [Taylorן, in fact, they was so bad at first our men said they would not do $\ldots$ he excels in dunning a character ... and then sporting red coats in hunting 3 or 4 days weekly. On 3rd January 1881 Taylors commented:

As regards the bells not being heard so far off that is a matter which will right itself. It is a well-known fact that the sound of bells carries further after use for a few months. We cannot say why but such is the case. On 4th January 1881 Canon Hutton wrote to Taylors in quite strong terms to the effect that the bells were not satisfactory because they were not in tune with themselves or Great Tom'. He insisted on Taylors 'sending a representative to hear for himself". On 5th January 1881 Taylors sent a rather apologetic letter undertaking to go to Lincoln to hear the bells and on 1 lth January 1881 the Dean wrote -I cannot at all understand the problem of the quarter bells but feel pretty satisfied the truth lies somewhat in between the theories of Mr Young and Mr Taylor.'

After a gap of nearly two months, on 7th March 1881 the Dean was once again to write to Canon Hutton:

I suppose Young triumphs at the conclusion arrived at with regard to the chime bells. I do not gather from your note that anything has been done to improve them except hitting them somewhat harder (as the Govt. are doing with Ireland) \& I shall he glad if the measure is successful enough to produce acquiescence on the part of our minutely diminutive against. The slight flatness of Tom may symbolize the
platitudinous distraction of old age in comparison with the sharpness of youth which is natural perhaps to bells as boys. I confess I do not feet courageous enough to attempt to reform Tom, which I suppose Taylor would suggest
The Dean was, no doubt, referring to the decision of the Chapter to have the notes of the quarter bells flattened. The Chapter agreed that Canon Hutton's opinion of the bells alone was acceptable and that a second opinion was not needed. As a result, on the same day, Hutton wrote to the bellfounders instructing them to have the bells 'flattened to the pitch of Tom's note'. Not surprisingly Taylors reacted on 12 th March 1881 by saying that they were most reluctant to do this and would only do the work if the Dean and Chapter 'take upon themselves the responsibility of spoiling the bells by flattening them ...

No agreement seemed possible and on 18th March 1881 the Dean and Chapter suggested that Dr. Stainer, organist of St. Paul's Cathedral, be asked to pass judgment. Although Taylors agreed to this, they still considered that the matter could be settled locally

In a letter dated 2nd April 1881 Potts reported he:
had a letter from Sir E. Beckett yesterday and was not aware but you had given him an invitation for the Easter holidays ... he cannot be idle, that is out of the question work he will have and money he has almost to any amount but more than he can ever spend, he is
65 now ... he has got a pretty good stiff job to restore \& complete St Albans Cathedral
Apparently Sir Edmund was pleased with the clock and according to Putts considered that "the quarters sounded very nice and the hours perfect'. However, even after such an eminent favourable opinion, Mr. Young was still not satisfied and on 30th May 1883 he once again wrote to the long-suffering Canon Hutton:
.. Messrs. Taylors came over on Saturday as arranged and I went with them into the cathedral bell Chamber and tested the Chimes. The result was they agreed with me that the A bell is too sharp it being out of tune with the other three bells and also with "Tom".
Mr. Young wrote again on 5th June 1881: - Mr. Taylor Senr. came over on Tuesday and tuned the A bell and on the Wednesday I tested it with an A Fork and find it is in tune with it.' At long last the correspondence ceases; the new quarters were to everyone's satisfaction!

Details of the new bells are as follows:

These bells can still be heard sounding, during daylight hours, the passage of time as they have now done for the last century or so.

We were on holiday in Devon, and I had spent a very pleasant practice night at Ottery St. Mary. At the end of the practice, I was pressed to join them for a wedding that Saturday: they were one ringer short. Of course, the Saturday was one of the best days of the holiday, and it was a very understanding family that let me drag them off the beach and into the church. But it was worth

In case, you have not been there, the bells at Ottery are rung from the ground floor of the south transept, in full sight of the congregation. So, as we sat waiting to ring at the end of the service, we had a grandstand view of the bride and groom. The story was a romantic one: a Swiss family had spent many holidays in the area: the son had fallen in love with a local girl and this was the wedding. Nearly half of the congregation were Swiss friends and relations. I have never seen a bride so happy. She smiled and laughed throughout the service and, at an appropriate moment, a shaft of sunlight came through a high window and lit her as if by a spotlight.
The end of the service came; the organ played; we started to ring. Some of the Swiss guests looked at us puzzled, uncertain as to what we were doing. But then they went outside, heard the bells and ran back in to look again.
I have rung for many weddings. Most of the time I ignore the service and just look forward to the money. But I have never forgotten this one.

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## Good progress at Blacklands

In September 1992 a Bells Appeal was aunched to raise funds for the re-hanging of the bells at Christ Church. Blacklands near Hastings with new frictional parts. The launch week included a dramatic abseil down the church tower, a door to door collection and fun activities. Over the next two years a tireless committee organised many fund raising events and the bell ringers held a sponsored walk ringing at towers on the way and tower open days. There was great rejoicing in September 1994 when it was realised that with generous grants from the Sussex Bell Restoration fund and the local lsobel Blackman Charity the work could go ahead as scheduled on monday 17th October 1994. The cost of the work by the Whitechapel Bell Foundry was reduced by $£ 5,854$ as ringers from the Sussex County Association assisted the bell hanger with the dismantling and rehanging of the bells.

Our own team of ringers had grown since the launch of the Bells Appeal with a group of enthusiastic leamers. We worked hard together to clean out the tower, decorate the ringing chamber and clean down and paint the bell frame - three coats with a top coat of bright red! On practice nights we gathered together and learned handbell ringing to play tunes at the Rededication service and at Christmas.

On December IIth 1994 Festival Evensong was held on the occasion of the re-dedication of the Bells and Bell Tower. The Vicar, the Rev P. J. Le Sueur conducted and preached at the service during which he thanked all who had been involved in the project over the last four and a half years. Ringers from near and far came to try out the newly hung bells and all enjoyed the ease of ringing.

On Saturday 25th March 1995 a peal of Oxford Bob Triples spliced with Grandsire Triples was successfully rung in 3 hours to celebrate the re-hanging of the bells and the 90 th Birthday of Mr J A Downing. Captain Emeritus. This was arranged by those who had helped with the re-hanging and our own tower was represented by Mrs J Le Sueur, the Vicar's wife who rang her first Peal on the Treble.

The other ringers were: 2 nd Mrs L Pink, 3rd Ms V Howard, 4th Mr C Slade, 5th Mr M Dawkins, 6th Mr A Pink, 7th Mr A Baldock (Conductor), 8th Mr R Cox.
Our present Bell Tower Captain, Mrs E Chapman and ringers welcome visitors to practice nights on Friday, 7.30-9 p.m. and Sunday ringing 9.45 a.m., 1 st and 3 rd, $5.45 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. 2nd and 4th.

National Lottery funding for bell restoration schemes
As a result of a recent meeting between Central Council officials and English Heritage, a full report of which appears elsewhere, the following advice is offered to anyone who might be considering applying for National Lottery money for bell restoration schemes through the National Heritage Memorial Fund.

Applications will be considered for bell schemes which aim to "maintain historical integrity in a heritage setting". This means that the bells, bell frame or tower should be of national or local importance from a historical point of view.
2. The tower itself should be in a good state of repair, and there should be no greater priorities for repair in the church or other building containing the bells.
3. The total cost of the scheme should be at least $£ 10$, ()(0), a proportion of which must be found from other sources. The percentage is not yet decided, but the parnership concept is considered to be important. The money will have to be spent within a specified period of time (yet to be determined).
4. Funding is unlikely to be available for new bells or a new bell frame alone, and will not be available for maintenance work.
5. Enquiries about funding should be addressed to the National Heritage Memorial Fund at 10 St James's Strect, London SWIA IEF (telephone 0171649 1345). Potential applicants will be sent the Guidelines and Application Pack. Applications will have to include an evaluation of the history of the bells and frame and an assessment of the cost and feasibility of repairs to the existing features, and an assessment of the repair needs of the whole church.

Details of applications made for Lottery funding are of course confidential between the applicant, the National Heritage Memorial Fund and English Heritage. Neverheless, it would assist the Council in seeking to advise those who might be considering applying for Lottery money if some information were available on the applications for schemes involving bells which have already been made. It would therefore be much appreciated if those who have applied and those who now do so would kindly let me have brief details of the applications.

## Unsure? - Then ASK!

I read with interest Tom Morgan's letter ( p .320 ) about the need for adequate supervision when work is to be undertaken in the belfry. I agree entirely that there should be some form of supervision if the work is to be done by 'amateurs', but in this day it is getting surprisingly difficult to find someone who has served an apprenticeship, let alone in mechanical engineering. But why mechanical engineering. This is a very vague description as the machinists at my work are, theoretically, mechanical engineers, and they served an apprenticeship at some very reputable establishments, but have no experience of the skills required when working on bell installations. The most dangerous part of any major work has got to be when the bells and fittings are being lifted and moved around the belfry using winches etc. It is during these operations that disaster could strike and this is surely where technical knowledge would be very bencficial. having said this, most major works are overseen by a bell hanger who will supervise, even if he doesn't do the work himself.

In Kent, there is a bell restoration subcommittee of the KCACR which undertakes to remove bells and occasionally hang them to save on bell hangers fees. Having worked with them a few times many years ago, I know that they are very good, work with a high degree of professionalism and a strong regard to safety, but as far as I am aware (apologies to those concerned if I am wrong on this point) they haven't been trained mechanically. Their professions include dentistry, electrical engineering, and horticulture... Instead they have been taught by listening to and watching their predecessors and have become experts in this field, much more use than an apprenticeship in mechanical. As far as I know, most associations have a group like this that undertake this type of work and assist steeple keepers in their jobs. Certainly round my area, people are unwilling to do anything major without first seeking the advice of someone with considerable knowledge.

I wonder if something 'nasty' has happened to cause Mr Morgan to write, but I would recommend him talking to his association's restoration committee or working party if he is unsure of any major work that has been done. As for the M.O.T., that's the biggest load of rubbish in the motoring world, but that's another story. Certainly the moral of the story is, if you are unsure, ASK!

## What Price Progress?

The introduction of computer simulated ringing and the recent BBC television news reports of Minehead tower's silenced practice nights need to be treated with extreme care by the exercise. While not wishing to discourage those who find the use of computer simulated ringing beneficial I foresee great interest by members of the public and local councils who do not have ringing interests at heart. If it could be argued that beneficial ringing practices could take place without disturbing members of the public who do not wish to hear church bells then any local council could impose an order which forces a tower to hold such silenced practices.
I know that I was first drawn to the exercise by hearing only five bells at a local practice in a six bell tower, and I believe that the sound of the bells is a valuable recruitment aid for towers. I hope that the silence of towers which use computer simulated ringing does not eventually lead to she permanent silencing of all church bell ringing.

## Unfair to quarters

This is the time of year for thoughts of grabbing. To aid the plans and the dreaming, this is also the time of year for obtaining annual reports. Having obtained reports it is the time of year to read them.

Something struck me whilst I was reading a selection of this year's batch. Reports contain all the sorts of things that any annual report would contain. Things like accounts and a little billetdoux from the patron and items from the boss and the secretary etc. are common place. the bulk of reports are then taken up with tower details and lists of members. Given that local bands, practices and service ringing are the rib cage of the exercise this is all very reasonable

Peal ringing also takes up a significant part of most reports with details of peals rung during the year and some statistical analysis of leading peal ringers and conductors taking up a page or two. Again, I consider this to be wholly reasonable.

What does strike me as strange is that often there is little by way of information relating to quarter peals. Given that quarters are usually rung at about three times the rate as peals and involve large numbers of ringers of all abilities and given their developmental role I would expect information relating to quarters to form a significant part of a report everr if the space so consumed was less than the space taken up by peals.

Not only do quarters often not figure to any great extent in reports but in some reports there is no mention of quarters at all! There is no hint or passing reference. It is almost as though someone has gone through the document with a censor's pen and removed all offending material. Is this balanced? Should quarter peal ringers be ashamed?
Perhaps Associations and quarter peal ringing are nothing to do with each other?

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## Industrial espionage -or plagiarism

I read Bill Perrins' letter (RW 24 Feb 95) with interest, being one of the "parties in Sydney" looking at peal construction after some details about Colin Wyld's peal appeared on Internet and I would like to correct some misunderstandings in the ensuing correspondence.

Philip Saddleton (RW 3 March 95) makes no secret of his access to the information on Internet, from which he knew that Colin had composed a Single-free peal of Stedman Triples with an amazingly large number of Bobs. Once the existence of such a peal is known the problem of composition becomes significantly easier, indeed Philip himself comments that Colin's achievement was the "bit of inspiration that provided the missing piece of the jigsaw". How, then, can Robin Hall (RW 10 March 95) possibly believe that the solution of Andrew Johnson and Philip was "independent"?

On Internet there have also been various snippets about other composers who found similar structures soon after the "leak", before full details were available, with comments of surprise that it should happen almost at the same time, indeed "simultaneous combustion" is mentioned: what rubbish! Colin did it, and enough about his work was known to make attainable to others what they had been unable to do before. Brian Price, who also composed such a peal at this time, describes it as "industrial espionage", at this university it would be plagiarism, that is "the use of another person's work without giving proper credit" (Australian Catholic University, NSW, 1995 Handbook). Are there not comparable regulations about compositions of change ringing?

I agree with Robin Hall that Philip Agg's achievement in remembering and calling the peal is noteworthy in its own right, but this surely evades the main issue. Had he conducted any other equally complicated peal, would anyone have been interested?

Using information now widely published, Roger Eyland and Humphrey Gastineau-Hills (my co-workers) trained our computer to compose Single-less peals of Stedman Triples: it came up with more than a hundred in two minutes. You see, it's easy when you know how. BERNICE SHARP

## "Knaveries" of the 50s

Anyone who can remember the striking contests of the Bamsley and District Society and the Halifax and District Association in the '40s and '50s (and there are not many left now who can) will recall only too well the keenness of competition. Perhaps in reflection of this keenness the rules governing the contest were also keen. Those ancients who initially drew up the rules had a firm belief that bells sounded "better" on the evening rather than afternoon ai but whether or not there is any scientific evidence to support this theory, I'll leave it Their belief, nonetheless, was unshakeable and it was always felt that bands ringing after tea were at a distinct advantage. To prevent any band purposely availing itself of this advantage by not being ready to ring "as drawn" and therefore ringing last, it was ordained that any band not ready to ring in its place should, if there was no lawful excuse, be ordered to ring last and incur a handicap of 30 penalty faults

At a contest for the Halifax Association Cup held at Elland on 1st April 19050, such a fate befell the Shelley "A" team. But Oh Dear naughty Shelley! In an attempt to avoid the 30 penalty handicap, unknown to anyone they changed places with their " $B$ " team, allowing their "lesser mortals" to be sacrificed by ringing last and attracting the penalty faults. It did them no good, however, for when their "knaveries" were discovered they were immediately disqualified!

It would appear that this was not the only incident to have occurred that day. Perhaps: because of a late start and with eight bands competing, it was decided that the usual test piece of 600 changes be reduced to 504 , but both the Meltham and Friezland bands overlooked this minor (excuse the pun) amendment and disqualified themselves by ringing a 600 each. It is, nevertheless, interesting to note the prowess of the Friezland band at that time. Despite ringing four leads more than anyone else (Meltham excepted of course) they still amassed the least amount of faults but due to disqualification could not claim the cup, which in the event went to Cawthome

## English Heritage

The report of the first mecting between the Officers of the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers and representatives of English Heritage was reported in The Ringing World of 13 January 1995. A second meeting with English Heritage took place on Thursday 2 March 1995. The following attended: Messrs Richard Halsey and Graham Pledger and Mrs Sally Embree of EH: Dr Thomas Cocke of the Council for the Care of Churches (CCC); and the President and Secretary of the Central Council and the Chairmen of the Bell Restoration Funds and Towers and Belfries Committees (Messrs John Barnes and Alan Frost). The following is a reporn of that meeting, written by the Secretary and Agreed with EH.

1. National Lottery - The National Heritage Memorial Fund (NHMF) had recently issued Lottery Update No 4, which contained the following paragraph: The Heritage Lottery Fund is able to consider applications for restoring and conserving church bells and organs to maintain historical integrity in a heritage setting.
conducted 12 of these peals including 3 of Superlative. and 6 of Grandsire Triples. In hand he rang 2, including one conducted.

Perhaps his most cherished achievement during these young years was the claim to be the youngest ringer to conduct Holt's Original onepart Grandsire Triples at Thurcaston two days before his 16 th birthday with his two brothers Edward and Leonard. Two weeks later he repeated this feat at Quom and on Christmas Eve at his home, rang and conducted his first peal of Doubles in hand with Edward and Leonard, whose first peal in hand it also was. We know that he completed 100 peals before he was 18, but sadly no accurate records are kept of the suggested total of about 1500 before his illness caused his retirement.

Has the exercise produced a similar remarkable record of a teenager"?

## Hindrance to Progress

I have retiened a copy of a Ringing World dated 20hh February 1953. It contains an article entitled "A note upon some aspects of Stedman Triples", which ends with the unambiguous and authoritative statement "Hence it is impossible to obtain a peal of Stedman Triples with common bobs only"

About a year ago I showed this to Simon Melen, who quickly reached the conclusion that the proxof was not valid; subsequent events have proved him right.

One might wonder why the validity of the proof was not challenged at the time of publication - there was no shortage of mathematician bellringers at the time. Perhaps the reason was that we all "knew" that a bobsonly composition was impossible and when one sees evidence which confirms what one believes to be true, one tends not to examine it too critically. There must be a moral here, or at least a caution about the nature of mathematical proof.

It tox)k a new generation of clever young men. unencumbered by the knowledge that it was impossible, to solve the problem.

One last thought - the author of the 1953 prouf called himself "Q.E.D." I wonder, is he still with us and if so would he like to identify hiself? - jusi for interest of course, not to receive recriminations for holding up progress for 42 years.

However, the Fund is not able to assist with maintenance and replacement of parts merely for the purpose of modernising the bells or organs to make them easier to play.
2. At the meeting Mrs Embree explained that EH was acting as expert adviser to the NHMF and that they were being consulted on applications to the Heritage Lottery Fund relating to ancient monuments, sites of archaeological importance, historic buildings and their contents, designed landscapes and industrial archacology in England. The NHMF would hold back any applications which did not comply with the relevant criteria. but most, including those for bell schemes, would be referred to EH. To meet the heritage criterion the bells, frame or tower needed to be of national or local importance. In addition, the NHMF would wish to be assured that there were no greater priorities for repair in the church or other building containing the bells, that the tower itself was in a good state of repair and that any funding would be in addition to, rather than in place of, any Government grant. The general requirement for public access was likely to be met if the church or other building was open to the public.
3. While EH would advise on the merits of applications. NHMF would also apply other criteria, such as the need to provide a good geographical spread of funding. NHMF would expect to determine applications within five months of receipt. If funds in any year were exhausted. NHMF might advise applicants to reapply for the following year. They would not nomally expect to consider projects with a total cost of less than $£ 10,000$ ) and the Heritage Lottery Fund would not provide $100 \%$ of the total costs of any project, as the parnership concept was important. No formula for percentage grants had yet emerged: it would be for the NHMF Trustees to decide the proportion in the light of each application. It would be necessary to ensure that the money would be spent within a specified period.
4. Mr Halsey said that EH would have to commission individuats to provide them with independent expert advice, for which payment would be made. EH would liaise with the CCC to create a nationwide list of bell experts and to devise an appropriate brief. Advice on lottery funding would have to be given alongside the normal activities of EH and the CCC, and it was important to ensure that consistent advice was given. It was recognised that the number of expers available 10 give advice on grants for bell schemes would be limited.

5. EH wished to ensure that potential applicants received the best possible advice. A leaflet would be produced by NHMF giving guidelines for applications by churches and it should be possible to include guidance on applications for bell schemes. It was agreed that the Central Council could assist by offering guidance through The Ringing World. This should be based on the paragraph from Lottery Update quoted above and should make it clear that funding was untikely to be available for new bells or new bellframes alone. The Millennium Fund may well be interested in helping to create new rings of bells, but the Central Council should investigate that with them. EH would be able to guide the Central Council better on Lottery Fund applications after a number had been considered by the NHMF Trustees.
6. Bells and bell frames - It had been agreed at the first meeting that it might be useful to discuss the principles arising from particular cases of difficulty where EH were involved. Two such cases were discussed in some detail. In the first case one possibility was to rehang the five bells in the existing frame. Another was to install a new frame for six bells lower in the tower, leaving the old bell frame in its existing position with the minimum of repair. There were, however, difficulties with both proposals and it was agreed that a site meeting attended by all the interested parties would be beneficial. The second case concerned a larger ring in an old frame. Major restoration work has been carried out in 1991, but there was still substantial frame movement. making the bells difficult to ring. It was accepted that with this type of frame a with degree of maintenance would always be required.
7. The Essex hell frame survey - EH reported that the field work had been completed. but some historical record searches were still to be done. The work would continue a little way into the next financial year. Mr Barnes mentioned the survey of 3 and 4 -hell towers being carried out by the CC Bell Restoration Funds Committee, and Dr Cocke asked that the results should be fed through to the CCC.
8. Code of Practice on the Conservation and Repair of Bells and Bellframes - Some concerns were expressed regarding the application of the principles of the Code in assessing bells which were not listed and on the tuning of bells. Dr Cocke said that he was arranging a meeting of interested parties to discuss the application of the Code for November 1995 and he would ensure that these issues were raised at that meeting.
9. Leaflet on ElI's role in work on historic churches - The leaflet on the system of control over work on historic churches, which had been mentioned at the first meeting, had been produced and copies were distributed.
10. Conclusion - In thanking the EH representatives for the meeting, Mr Rogers offered the assistance of the Central Council in advising on applications for lottery funding for bell schemes.

## Something worth holding onto

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## A great success

The East Lindsey District of Lincolnshire has many towers with rings of bells. Some of the churches are redundant and the bells have either been removed or stand idle and forlorn on the tower flocor: others have bells which cannot be rung because the tower is unsafe or the fittings need replacing. Worse still there are a majority of towers which have ringable bells, but no-one to ring them. Many have just a few ringers who cannot progress heyond rounds and call changes hecause there is no-one to teach them.
With these ringers in mind, Tony Barker. tower captain of St. Peter \& St Paul, Ingoldmells and St Nicholas, Addlethorpe, arranged a one day ringing course recently. The tutors were Clive and Lucy Smith of Lichfield Cathedral, well-known to students on the Hereford and Grantley Hall Ringing Courses.
Fifteen ringers attended who were assisted by fifteen experienced ringers from as far atield as Gainsborough, Lincoln and Wragby. They ranged in age from 12 to 60 . The youngsters were all boys who were very keen indeed.
Plain Humt was concentrated on at one tower with Plain Bob at the other. By the end of the day everyone had made some improvement in technique and ringing skills and were more than ready for further practice in their own towers. The day was a great success and follow-up session is planned. Next year it is hoped to run a full weekend course.

Without the experienced helpers it would have been impossible to run the course and the students would not have made the progress they did. The tuition and guidance has given us a great boost and we returned to our towers more contident and proficient.

## "The 'Bitsa' Blue Line" <br> by F. E. Warboys

"So, what's all this then?" "Lord Home's matchsticks?" "Chinese hieroglyphs?" "An inky spider gone mad?"' Such is the jocular "ridicule" in which bellringing friends often indulge when they see my version of a blue line - especially after the second pint!
I know the old adage says "Never explain; your friends don't need it and others won't believe you anyway", nevertheless, having endured much good natured banter over the ycars without riposte, perhaps I ought to explain. I call the images by which I ring methods 'ideograms' (written signs which directly represent whole concepts). Sceptical friends have laughingly called them "the 'Bitsa' blue line." Readers of The Ringing World might like to see what they're like.
Blue line apostasy started when I progressed from Plain Bob to other Methods. Whilst, like everyone else, I wanted a visual image in my mind of what I had to ring, unlike other folk. the traditional continuous blue line did not seem to meet my need. I found that the very continuity of the traditional blue line did not make for ease of leaming. In those days, subtle differences between one line and another were difficult to see and difficult to keep in mind whilst ringing. Additionally, the traditional line did not tell me at a glance, where wrong places came in the sequence. I therefore looked for some way of breaking the 'solid' blue line into "bits" so that the elements of the sequence became - for me - more individually recognisable. 1 looked for a way to make any line digestible, easy to recall and to translate coherently into ringing action.
The first answer was to use a form of symbolic place notation (Diag. 'A'.) which showed the movement of bells in handstroke/ backstroke pairs. it showed wrong and right places and it was easy to indicate the treblepassing positions within it. Learning methods by such diagrams served me well for some time. Eventually I looked for a way of reducing their elongation so that information could be assimilated without too much eye movement. I wanted the work of each place-bell to be recognisable as a compact entity.
My initial attempt at condensing the Diag. ' $A$ ' structure resulted in patterns like the example shown in Diag. 'B'. Handstroke/backstroke pairs were indicated by a shor line with a dot at the handstroke end. Horizontal lines indicated hunting. Right places were indicated by lines drawn vertically. Dodges were indicated by lines drawn at $45^{\circ}$; the position of the handstroke dot showed the direction of the dodge. Wrong places were immediately obvious. The whole was condensed into a group of lines within a reasonable compass, which was recognisable as an entity. The structure was like a group of letters forming a familiar word.
As time passed, the ideograms became less formal. A tweak here and there made some easier to memorise. They all took on a 'personality' of their own. (Diag. 'C'). Handwritten, they looked a bit like Chinese characters and could be writen with similar flexibility without impairing the essential information which they carried. Experience showed that it was not necessary to show handstrokes with a dot; a line's contest in the ideogram was sufficient to indicate direction of flow. It is these informal ideograms which make traditional hlue-line ringers chuckle.

Structuring ideograms probably seems

unnecessarily complicated to those who find traditional blue lines or numerically expressed place notation, easy to memorise and ring. They might rightly ask "What does the effort of creating ideograms buy you?"

I accept without demur that the advantages which I see are not valid for everyone, but idengrams buy me the following

They reduce the blue line for a given placebell into a small easily recognised and casily memorised compass.
They divide the seemingly meandering solid blue line into discrete (but still sequential) steps.
These steps show ring and wrong places and the treble-passing places are easily indicated
The ideogram represents a place-bell lead as a whole which can easily be seen as an entity in the mind's eye whilst ringing.
Clearly there are also disadvantages.

1. Before one learns a new method, one has to create one's own set of ideograms. However, this process itself helps in the analysis and memorising of the method.
2. It is unfamiliar to other ringers; I have not yet met another who uses it. One cannot, therefore, use one's own terms when talking to other ringers about methods. One has to translate one's thoughts into traditional nomenclature.
Learning methods by means of ideograms has served me well over the years but I know they won't suit everybody's thinking or visualising processes. For traditionalists, the whole idea probably gives rise to wry and amused smiles. But, maybe out there somewhere is a struggling tyro who is looking, as I was years ago, for a different angle to get him or her over the hump which divides basic from more advanced ringing. To them I say "try ideograms". The idea is flexible; your ideograms don't have to be just like mine. If the process of creating them does nothing else, it will set you analysing the method you want to learn. But, look out for the scepticism of your friends!

## Central Council Committee Reports

## Administrative Committee

Since the 1994 Council meeting the Committee has met twice in London, in October and March. The arrangements for the 1995 Council meeting were discussed and agreed, and the following matters were considered:
(1) Appointment of auditor - Andrew G Smith (Dorset C.A.) has been appointed as one of the Council's auditors in place of Michael Church, who was re-appointed to that position last year following the resignation of John Parsons.
(2) The format and audit of charity accounts Regulations are expected to be made shortly relating to the format and audit of the accounts of charities. They are likely to come into force on lst December 1995 for financial years beginning on or after that date. The committee will be considering the options which this will present for the Council's accounts and will report back to the next Council meeting.
(3) Financial matters - It was reported last year that the Committee had decided in principle that the offices of Secretary and Treasurer should be separated. A motion to create an office of Honorary Treasurer appears on the agenda for the Council meeting. The Committee has also decided to introduce a more formal budgeting process. Following consultation with committee chairmen, the Officers will present to the October meeting of the Committce each year a budget for the Council's General Fund for the following year. To enable the Committee to monitor expenditure and income against budget, the Treasurer will report on expenditure and income for the tirst nine months of the year at the October meeting and for the whole year at the March meeting. It was also agreed that the Accounts as presented to the Council should show the expenditure incurred by each committee. This information is given in the Accounts for 1994.
(4) Complaints about bells - The working group set up by the Committee under the chairmanship of John Anderson has been collecting information on a wide variety of complaints about ringing. The group plans to set up a network of advisers and will be providing written guidance for dealing with complaints. members of the working group have also given advice in cases which have occurred, in particular at St Elisabeth's, Reddish, Greater Manchester, as a result of which court action has been postponed while the possibility of installing sound control is investigated.
(5) English Heritage - Following an approach by the President, two meetings have heen held with English Heritage, both of which have been reported in The Ringing World. Concern has been expressed at previous Council meetings and elsewhere about cases of bell restoration schemes where the interests of ringers and those of English Heritage have appeared to have been diametrically opposed. It was therefore considered important that each side should try to understand the other's point of view and should together scek solutions that are acceptable to both. Discussion centred round old bell-frames. The view of English Heritage is that, if a frame is important historically or in relation to the church or bells, it should be retained, preferably in use. If retention in use is impossible, then English Heritage would seek other means of preserving it. At the first meeting general principles were discussed and much useful information was gained as to English Heritage's precise role in these matters. It was then agreed that regulat meetings should be held between
the Council, English Heritage and the Council for the Care of Churches, at which particular cases of difficulty and the principles arising from them could be discussed.
(6) National Lottery and the Millenium Commission - The Council has a role to play in providing information to potential applicants for National Lottery funding for bell restoration projects. English Heritage is being consulted on all applications to the Heritage Lottery Fund involving historic buildings and their contents, including bell schemes. They were thus able to advise the Council at the second of the meetings referred to above of the criteria against which bell schemes are likely to be judged. This advice and other practical information is to be published in The Ringing World.

The Millenium Commission is looking for rather larger projects for Millennium Fund support. The Ringing Centres Committee has agreed to consider the possibility of working up a proposal for the creation of a major ringing centre in London, incorporating a museum and information centre about ringing. Other practical ideas would be welcome.
(7) Regional seminars - Four regional seminars, sponsored by The Ringing World, are to take place on 20th May at Towcester, 8th July at Lancaster, 15th July at Taunton and 23rd September in London. They are aimed at association officers with the objectives of updating them on current issues, such as health and safety in towers, complaints about bells and ringing centres, and provoking discussion on recruitment, training, maintenance, fund raising and the organisation of ringing. The Committee hope that officers of all affiliated societies will attend.
(8) Peal records and peal boards - The Committee have asked the Computer Coordination Committee to consider providing databases for maintaining records of peals rung and for collecting information about peal boards. Action taken on these two items is reported in that Committee's report.

## Peal Compositions Committee

The year has been one of consolidation, with few new initiatives. We continue to prove and review compositions submitted for publication to The Ringing World. The number printed has fallen slightly this year, partly due to changes in our procedures, and partly due to the demise of Which Method, whose deadlines imposed a useful discipline. Although we remain committed to the publication of all compositions submitted, we urge composers to exercise a greater degree of self-criticism. The ready availability of computer-proving software has greatly increased the number of indifferent peals, especially of spliced. and the composition mountain grows steadily (like Rockall).

The Committce receives a large number of requests each year for specific compositions. In almost all cases these have been met satisfactorily, sometimes by commissioning new work. Particular credit is due to David Beard for his efforts in this area. We have also assisted other members and Committees of Council, checking entries for the next edition of An Index to Compositions in The Ringing World for Tony Smith and beginning investigations (with Julian Morgan) into the feasibility of machineprocessable composition formats. This follows an initiative by the Computer Coordination Committee and if successful promises to greatly simplify the problem of storing and retrieving compositions in computer databases, and to eliminate typographical errors once and for all. However, we do not underestimate the difficulty of the problem, nor anticipate early results.

One consequence of the much-hyped "Information Superhighway" is that electronic media will become increasingly important for disseminating ringing information, particularly collections requiring frequent update. With this in mind, an experimental World-Wide Web page has been constructed (URL http://www.doc.ic.ac.uk/rb/ringing.html) containing a number of composition and method collections. Comments on this (or any other compositional matter, including submissions for publication) can be sent to the Chairman by electronic mail (rb@doc.ic.ac.uk). Of collections in preparation. Stedman Triples has now been convincingly completed by the addition of two bobs-only peals. A draft version of this, and also of General-Purpose Surprise Major is available on the World-Wide Web as described above; paper publication should follow Real Soon Now. Spliced Surprise has been delayed slightly by Roddy Horton's change of job, but is still expected by the end of the triennium. The new editions of Compositions in the Popular Major Methods and of Ten and Twelve Bell Compositions are making slow progress, as are the yearly compilations of The Ringing World compositions

With the move to more modem computer equipment, the Committee's old BBC Microcomputer is now surplus to requirements. and currently serves as a large doorstop in the Chairman's office. The entire setup (model B with word processor chip, monochrome monitor, twin double-sided disk drives and daisy-wheel printer) is available to anyone who can make use of it (not necessarily as a doorstop), and no reasonable offer will be refused.

## Rescue fund for redundant bells

The Fund received several enquiries as to whether it had rescued any rings of bells that could be hung in the enquirer's church, but supply did not match demand - there were apparently no rings of bells in immediate danger in 1994 that were not safely under the careful watch of a ringing association or bell hanging firm. The Fund Committee has therefore only had the ex Birmingham bells to worry over. Terms were agreed in Autumn 1994 for the St Helen's Bell Fund Charitable Trust to acquire the bells from Whitechapel Bell Foundry on repayment of the Rescue Fund deposit. A payment of $£ 5,500$ has been made on account and it may be the case that the whole sum will be repaid during 1995. Alternatively, an instalment programme will be agreed. The purchasing charity intend to hang the bells at Escrick Parish Church near York and the existing ring of eight will be hung elsewhere without the involvement of the Rescue Fund.
Thanks are due as ever to those patient and loyal ringers and associations who have provided loans to enable the bells to be saved from the sledge hammer.

## International liaison report for 1994

## Recruitment

It is very encouraging to leam that so many young people are learning to ring in Westerm Australia with the projected new installations of bells in the province, around Perth area. There should be an ample supply of ringers for all prospective and existing towers. Claremont, has special training sessions, in the capable hands of Mary Townsend, for the St Hilda's School, Mosman Park project - their practices are a 'nightmare'! A team of very keen learners is also being trained for the projected ring in Mandurrah Church.

York is not so fortunate and could do with some 'new blood'. Nevertheless, Eleanor Weekes deserves great credit for her perseverance, in that outpost, in keeping the bells ringing. She is supported by visits from Perth area 'experts' on a monthly basis.

Hobart, which was in 'low water' are on the up' again, having trained some learners.
In Kenya, as a result of the visit of the Kilifi ringers to the UK, their confidence is such that they are now recruiting and teaching leamers.

Honolulu report good progress with their latest recruits. In Zimbabwe, both towers report that there was an influx of learners

Capetown has had a resurgence of ringing at St Mary's, Woodstock. Thanks to the enthusiasm of George Siscum.

Since Grahamstown Cathedral bells were rededicated. Professor Colin Lewis has been kept very busy teaching a number of teenagers. At least eighteen of whom are regular ringers, and some of them have succeeded in ringing in quarter peals. He proposes lecturing to music students early in 1995 at Rhodes University.

## Peals and quarter peals

In the following list of leading quarter peal ringers for 1993, the following names appeared who rang more than fifty quarters: Mary Townsend, Eric White, Suzanne Biddles and Laura Ivey from Western Australia; Mathew Sorrell and Theresa Rice from Washington Cathedral. Congratulations to them.

The accompanying table shows the numbers of peals and quarter peals recorded as having been rung in the respective countries during the year. Against each country, the recorded figures have been amended (shown in brackets) to take account of late entries which appeared after the 1993 report was completed. The summation of the 1994 performances include those published in The Ringing World up to and including issue No. 4378. Ringing Towers to issue No. 29/1 and the Clapper to Vol. 22/1.

In all areas there were probably some quarters rung and never recorded, hence emphasising only numbers recorded were taken into the statistics.

Significant differences in figures between 1994 and 1993 show that:

Australia - 26 more peals were rung in 1994. but were down 17 with quarter peals

Canada had 8 more peals
New Zealand - no peals, but were up on quarter peals by 26

South Africa were down on peals by 7
USA had 14 more peals, hut dropped by 65 in the quarters range

Zimbabwe - no peals and 4 fewer quarters
(as recorded up to 24 March 1995)

Parktown. Johannesburg, South Africa reached the 50 th peal mark for their tower. being the first lower in Africa to do so. They also completed the 'Standard 8", with a peal of London Surprise Major.
During the year, St Mary's Basilica, Sydney, passed the 100th peal mark, as well as the 500th quarter peal, which covered a period of 150 years.

A record peal of 17,280 Spliced Surprise major in 7 methods was rung at St Cuthbert's, Prospect SA on 6 June in 9 hours and 25 minutes. The peal was composed by A J Pitman and James Smith and conducted by Bill Perrins. Included was Prospect Surprise Major, which had not previously heen rung.
The Versonese Association (ASCSV) is not among the great peal ringing societies, but this year two were scored. Giancarlo Gommasi rang the tenor to a quarter peal of Plain Bob Caters at St Matthias, Malvern Link. The first peal to be rung for ASCSV, Plain Bob Royal, was rung on the same bells - it was also the first peal on the new ten. A peal of Cambridge Surprise Major was also rung on the newly augmented light ring at 49 Green Lane, Malvern Wells on 12 October. The first tower bell quarter peal to be rung in Italy was rung by five visitors and one Italian - a handbell quarter peal was rung a few years ago in Gardo.
Bob Verrey of Honolulu rang in his first peal at his home tower to Grandsire Triples. He is the first Hawaiian to score a peal.
Progress in change ringing at St George's Cathedral, Grahamstown, SA shows that since the bells were rehung, five quarter peals have been rung which included six who had leamed to ring during the year, as well as some of the established ringers.
A number of methods were rung for the first time in Australia and America. They included peals:

Brimmer Delight Major at Boston USA
St Martin's Triples. Philadelphia. (Ist in America and for all the band)
McKillop Delight Major at St Mary's Basilica. Sydncy, NSW and followed by a peal in the method at Darling Point. NSW
As well as first in the methods, several peals in different surprise methods mainly of major were rung to peals.

## Tours

The 'Hapless' tour of Australian ringers took place in Tasmania, but a smaller number compared with previous tours took part. Consequently, pre-arranged peals had to be abandoned since some of those who were to take part in the attempts were stranded by floods.
A party from St Mary's Basilica, Sydney, with friends went on their outing to Goulburn and Yass, where they rang five quarter peals.

Melbourne and Geelong ringers enjoyed a weekend's outing to Beechworth in November.

Bob and Ruth Smith's louring party went to Australia and the highlight was the visit to Beechworth to help some keen youngsters with bell handling and to join the locals for ringing. The first quarter peal on the bells was successful and included two of the locals.
The Holy Rosary Cathedral, Vancouver ringers, accompanied by Lynn Kodrich, had an enjoyable week in Hawaii assisting the Honolulu St Andrew's ringers to make further progress. In reverse, a 'return' visit was made by Bob and Pam Verrey and family to Vancouver. who were joined by ringers from Victoria. It was

an internationally flavoured gathering and included ringers from Australia and the UK.

Bruce and Eileen Butler organised a tour for American ringers to East Anglia in the UK. They rang at 99 towers in 14 days. Unfortunately, tower number 100 was a 'lock out'!

St James's Guild, led by Alan Regin, toured America in January during which they rang thirteen peals. During the peal at Charleston, closed circuit television was used for the benefit of the continuous stream of visitors to the church!

Colin Turner led a party from the UK on a tour of the USA and scored a number of peals.
A Stedman method party in the charge of John Pladdys visited Canada and the USA and rang eleven peals.
Bob Cater brought a party of ringers and friends from the UK to Canada and the USA in July. Later, Jim Hedgecock's party were in America, whilst Paul Harden's party concentrated on Canada.

The annual visit by North American Guild members was made to Quebec for ringing at both the Cathedral and the Bibliotheque.

The Whitechapel Guild of Washington National Cathedral School held their annual outing in April and visited Charleston, Princess Anne and Raleigh. Rick Dirksen gave a talk on ringing at Princess Anne, which was illustrated by the Guild's demonstration of Plain Hunt on eight handbells. They rang for service at St Andrew's Episcopal Church.

Tina Stoecklin was sponsored by her university in the UK to spend six months in Africa to 'soak up aspects of local ringing'. Her two months in Kilifi, Kenya, were well spent, much to the benefit of the St Thomas's Church ringers, who later came to the UK on the visit organised by D Paul Smith and Deborah Blagden, and well supported by many ringing friends. The visitors obtained a lot of experience in ringing at the several towers arranged for them. They in lum entertained the hosts with their marvellous singing. It was a thrilling experience for both visitors and visited. On their return to Kenya, David Shaha wrote to The Ringing World to thank the UK ringers for the wonderful reception his ringers were accorded, about the benefits gained in the UK and expressed his hopes for scoring their first peal in 1995. As a result of the experience, more ringers are being recruited to the Kilifi band.

The Zimbabwe Guild has issued a most useful 4-page A5 leaflet for visitors, which provides information about the two rings of bells and ringing at them, places to stay, a brief account of the country and the average monthly temperatures and rainfall throughout the year.

In August, the Young Italians visited South Wales (featured on front page of 4.11.94 RW). as part of the ongoing youth exchanges. From the reports which have come back to us, they had a wonderful time and look forward to the 1995 visit to Italy.

## Miscellaneous

Australia: the bush fires came very close to 'ringing' early in the year but, thankfully, a change of wind direction saved a tower and a number of ringers' homes from injury.

David Knewstub wrote an interesting article in "Ringing Towers" under the title 'Digging up the Past in Perth'. It emphasised the work of Laith Reynolds in having rings installed in Australia and Honolulu and of his ambitions for Singapore.

During her visit to the UK, Mary Townsend rang in a peal especially arranged for her at Loughborough Bell Foundry.

# Obituary 

## Reginald Tipler

A tragic accident at his home two years ago from which he never recovered, brought to an end the life of a very popular man who was widely known for his entertainment skills and his presentation of a unique collection of slides and films to a wide variety of audiences. For 20 years he was a member of the baritone section of the Earl Shilton Male Voice Choir under the writer's conductorship.

His ringing tuition was under the instruction of Dick Belton's "Ringing School" at Barwell in the 1930 s and after service in the forces, attached himself to the Stoney Stanton belfry, from which village he married Ellen, and for several years was a member of their band. He rang six peals one of which in 1947 is recorded on one of Harry Webb's lovely peal tablets in slate in Barwell belfry.

His profession was in photography. He died at the age of 82 and his wife predeceased him.

## Brian Blackshaw

It was with shock and great sadness that we learned of the untimely passing of Brian Blackshaw of Cape Town and Durban, South Africa, (formerly of Worsley, Greater Manchester).
Brian came to ringing in middle age, as a result of an appeal in 1987 to the members of St Paul's Church, Durban for bellringers. He soon became totally dedicated to ringing and was a great asset to the Durban Guild. He was a member of the Sunday service band for several years and being a committed Christian, ringing for service was a great joy to him. He also loved to ring for weddings which were a frequent occurrence at St Paul's
Brian worked for a clothing company and was able to arrange for the making and screen printing of shirts for the Durban Guild. The shirts bore the symbols of St Paul's and St Mary's Churches and contributed enormously to the awareness by the Durban public of the existence and activitios of the guild. He also repainted the ringing chamber at St Paul's, and installed new windows containing transfers of medieval figures. The latter gave the appearance of stained glass windows which

were frequently admired by visiting ringers. Brian also provided a new carpet for the ringing chamber at St Paul's, and individual mats for both towers.

When the South African Guild was formed in Grahamstown in 1988. Brian became its first Secretary/Treasurer, a post which he held for two years and which he filled capably and conscientiously. The "Belgotex Shield", awarded at the annual SA Guild Striking Competition, was donated by Belgotex Carpets, a Pictermaritzburg company, as a result of Brian's efforts, and will form a lasting memorial to him.

The last few years of Brian's life were marred by his having to seek work further and further away from his home in Durban, culminating in his moving to Cape Town about three years ago. His wife, Angela, sadly became ill over the last two years and passed away at her daughter's home in High Wycombe in January. Brian was able to be with her, but tragically he was already terminally ill and only survived her by two months.

A peal of 4 -spliced Surprise maximus was rung at Reading as a tribute to Brian by the Society of Royal Cumberland Youths, the band containing Alan Regin who stayed at Brian's home during his first visit to South Africa in 1989. Quarter peals were rung at Priston, Avon and in Durban
Brian was a very gentle, unassuming person, who in his short ringing career made a significant contribution to the Exercise in South Africa. May he rest in peace.

## Frank Reed - a tribute

I first met Frank fifty years ago when we were both beginners in South Yorkshire and for a couple of years in the mid-forties we rang together two or three times each week. He rang his first peal at Bentley in 1945 (called by Eric Critchley) and he called my first peal in 1946 and rang the tenor to my first peal of Major the same year - also called by Eric. In those early days Frank was noted for his keenness and enthusiasm and he had lost none of this when our paths crossed again at an R.A.F. Guild meeting at Stowmarket after a gap of thirty five years. However he had gradually transferred his allegiance from peal ringing to the pursuit of new towers and so it was my wife Paddy and my three daughters who rang with him more than myself during recent years.

Frank joined the Royal Air Force as a regular, whereas 1 waited almost until the men in white caps came for me. Coincidentally we both had our first taste of foreign service here in Suffolk and Frank rang his first peal of Surprise at St. Mary-le-Tower - called by Sylvia Pipe who also called his first of D.N.C.B. Major at Framsden. He rang in the tirst peal of Bob Caters for the Suffolk Guild (a great talking point at the time) and would have completed 50 years membership of the Guild next year. He had just come up to the fifty year mark for the Yorkshire Association. I believe our last peal together was one of seven-Minor at his home tower of Bamby Dun which Frank called from the treble - forty four years ago.

My youngest daughter Dehorah attended Frank's funeral at Barnby Dun and represented our family. A memorial peal was rung by the Suffolk Guild at Monewden called by the Master.
